

PE and Sports Premium

Background

The government has announced that primary schools are to receive additional money for the purposes of improving the provision of PE and sport so that all primary age pupils develop healthy lifestyles.

Schools are permitted to allocate the sports premium allocation as they see fit, provided that it is used for the purposes of PE and sports. St. Elizabeth's Catholic Primary School will be held accountable for how we have used this additional funding.

It is expected that schools will see an improvement against the following 5 key indicators:

1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles
2. The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
5. Increased participation in competitive sport

Funding Allocation 2018-2019

St. Elizabeth's Catholic Primary School will receive a sports premium allocation of £17,750.
