Accessing eBooks: General

For permalinks (or a link to a specific book or chapter of a book), you may need to "Sign in with Google" (the blue button). This will prompt you to login with your email (*make sure you use your CCS email*) and then take you to the book.



Click on the link in the catalog to access the eBook.



Clicking on the link will take you to a login screen where you need to enter your CCS password and ID.

Computers (recommended)



Once inside the record, you have two options: **you can view the PDF in your browser window, or you can download the book** (either for a set period of time, or as a permanent PDF, if the option is available). These options are visible in the upper left hand corner.




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
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
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
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


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


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
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Once you are logged in to your EBSCO account, you will have downloading options. "EPUB" is not available but the "PDF" option should be pre-selected.

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Your Adobe ID is your CCS email and the password you set up for your access to the Adobe Creative Suite via CCS. You also need to make sure that the "Vendor ID" dropdown menu above the login area says "Adobe ID." Once you are logged in, it should take you to Adobe Digital Editions and your book will finish downloading and open.

FAQ

Adobe Digital Editions won't work with my older operating system - what do I do?

 You can try installing an older version of the software and see if that works http://download.adobe.com/pub/adobe/digitaleditions/ADE 3.0 Installer.dmg

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- Unfortunately, there is currently no way to preserve any annotations, notes, or highlights made in eBooks; these are permanently removed once the book is returned.
- Alternatives include:
 - Printing out only the pages you need and marking up the physical paper (black & white printing is free on campus for CCS community members).
 - Taking screenshots of the annotated pages on a laptop or desktop (this will not work on a mobile device, as screenshots are disabled).

How do I take a screenshot?

On a Mac:

- Shift + Command + 3 will screenshot the entire screen
- Shift + Command + 4 will allow you to use your cursor to capture part of the screen
- On a PC:
 - Windows key + "Prnt Scrn" will screenshot the entire screen
 - Windows key + Shift + S will allow you to user your cursor to capture part of the screen; you will need to paste this into another program
- On a mobile device:
 - Adobe Digital Editions disables screenshots on mobile devices
 - Screenshots can be taken for books viewed in the browser

I borrowed a book on the computer - why isn't it syncing to my mobile device?

- Your content will sync only if you have logged in to Adobe Digital Editions with your Adobe ID (your CCS email + password you set up)
 - o If it is not syncing, you may have skipped authentication on your computer
- Another possibility is that you used your EBSCO specific account to sign in on one device, and used the "Sign in with Google" on your other device
 - You must use the same login across devices in order for syncing to occur

I downloaded a book to my mobile device, but now Adobe Digital Editions is requiring me to sign in again but it won't accept my login - what do I do?

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Why can't I see images in books on my phone?

- Images may not show up properly on your mobile device. If this does not resolve on its own, you will need to view images on a laptop or desktop.
- If the images appear inverted from positive to negative, it may be that you have set Adobe Digital Editions to a black background with white text; reverting back to a white background with black text should fix this issue.
