

Painting of the warriors

Hi, i'm an archaeologist, I first got into archaeology at the age of 11, when my school went on a field trip to a museum. Ever since that trip I have found a great interest in archaeology. This was my first expedition and I found something that was worth the wait. I found it off the Medaiterranean coast of Spain. It's a cave painting.

The painting is of some men killing a beast that looks something like a bull. The men were holding bow-like things. The bull is already down and the men are celebrating. I chipped a piece of the pigment off of the cave wall and put in a glass vial to analyze later. I also chipped off the rock, but I didn't put it in a vial this time, I have a little microscope that I use to look at rocks, and I found that the rock is limestone. I analyzed the pigment and it's plant based. I talked with some of my co-workers and all of the cave painting they found had plant based pigment to which was cool.

The cave was on the mediterranean coast of spain in Murcia. It was deep in a cave so it wasn't worn down by the weather. I found it by crawling into a hole that no one else could fit into and saw the painting and shouted to my team and took samples. The painting was made by the mesolithic.
