## Who can and cannot vote

Learn if you meet the qualifications to vote in federal, state, and local elections.

## Who can vote?

You can vote in U.S. federal, state, and local elections if you:

- Are a U.S. citizen (some areas allow non-citizens to vote in local elections only)
- Meet your state's residency requirements
  - You can be homeless and still meet these requirements.
- Are 18 years old on or before Election Day
  - In almost every state, you can register to vote before you turn 18 if you will be 18 by Election Day.
- Are registered to vote by your state's <u>voter registration deadline</u>. North Dakota does not require voter registration.

## Who cannot vote?

- Non-citizens, including permanent legal residents, cannot vote in federal, state, and most local elections.
- <u>Some people after a felony conviction</u> or who are currently serving time for other types of crimes. Rules are different in each state. <u>Check this guide from the Department of Justice</u> to understand the laws in your state.
- <u>Some people who are mentally incapacitated.</u> Rules vary by state.
- For president in the general election: U.S. citizens residing in U.S. territories
- Check with your <u>state or local election office</u> for any questions about who can and cannot vote.
