Ok, let's get right into it. As you all know, the department chair wears many hats and has many responsibilities. During my time as chair, I recall that advocating for my department was one of those responsibilities that snuck up on me. I always knew it was something that chairs needed to do, but I didn't realize just how big a part of my job it was until I'd been chairing for a while. During my first year as chair, I was focused on the "nuts and bolts" of running a department and I was generally pleased if I simply did all of the day-to-day things that I was supposed to do. Then, as I started to get more comfortable as chair, my mind began to focus more on other aspects of the chair job including being the department's advocate. And, towards the end of my time as chair, it seemed like advocating for the department was what I spent most of my time doing.

Effectively advocating is a multifaceted task that demands preparation and strategic thinking. Chairs must have a clear understanding of who they're representing and the goals they are trying to accomplish. Chairs must know who to communicate with to best achieve these goals and how to communicate with them. They must understand that balancing the task and social demands of any situation is crucial to achieving both immediate goals AND future goals. Importantly, chairs must also realize that bargaining, negotiating, making compromises, and making sacrifices are all part of the process of working towards the best interests of your department, your faculty, and your students. Sounds like what politicians do, right (or at least that's what they're

supposed to do)? Well, most of you (all of you?) were elected by your faculty to represent your department.

And, of course, we are in difficult times so the consequences of not successfully advocating for your department are potentially more severe than in the past.
