Abstract must be written in English. Abstract no more than 200 words. Abstract in English is written in TNR 10. Abstract should include five things, namely a brief introduction, research objectives/research questions, methods, results, and conclusions. The function of the abstract is to make the reader gain a general understanding of your article. Authors are expected to avoid common mistakes in making abstracts: 1) only attach the problem formulation, without explaining in more detail what was found in the study. Example: This paper examines the causes of sleeping too long (wrong). The cause of sleeping too long is sleeping too late, forgetting to set the alarm, and the room is always dark (right). 2) Only explain categories/concepts/variables in general. This paper finds important concepts in choosing communication media (wrong). This paper concludes that the most important concepts in choosing a communication medium are the speed with which it is accepted by the audience and the language that is easily understood by the audience (correct).

The script format is TNR 11, spaced 1, before and after spacing 3 pt, justify, with 3 cm left margin, 2 cm top, bottom, and right margin. Manuscripts are written in 5000-7000 words, includes tables and figures, but does not include REFERENCES.

The introduction contains the background of why this topic/research is interesting to be raised by the author. It also includes state of the art, novelty, and research objectives. Theoretical debates and analytical conceptual discussions can be written in the introduction.

Theoretical debates and conceptual discussions that are too long are suggested to be written separately with the introduction into sub-chapters. Authors are allowed to make additional sub-chapters after the introduction. The format of sub chapter is the same as Introduction, Research Methods, etc. but not in capital letters.

METHODS

Explain clearly and concisely regarding the choice of paradigm, method (data collection and analysis technique), logical framework, location, unit of analysis, and time of research.

RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

Explain the findings by presenting the data in a complete, accurate, systematic, and logical manner. Data visualization (tables, matrices, figures, or diagrams) must be presented and discussed in a clear and concise manner. In discussion, it is necessary to relate and explain the findings obtained with the concepts used/explained in the introduction and/or hypotheses. The discussion should include comparisons with previous articles related to the topic. The discussion also needs to show both theoretical and application implications.

CONCLUSION

Presenting conclusions that are able to answer the research objectives and show novelty or conceptualization of ideas. Don't write your conclusions in bullet points.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

If an acknowledgment is needed, for example to funders in project research activities. Written in one paragraph a maximum of 8 lines.

QUOTE

For direct quotations, if it is less than 3 lines, then there is no need to make a special paragraph. Just add an apostrophe “...” in the paragraph. If the direct quote is more than 3 lines, then the paragraph is indented with the following rules:

“Organic farming system is a "law of return" which means a system that seeks to return all types of organic matter into the soil, both in the form of crop residues and waste and livestock, which in turn aims to provide food for plants”. (Sutanto, 2002)

If the direct quotation is the result of an interview, then include information about the informant, location, and date of the interview. Example:

“We have been talking with the leadership for a long time about improving the infrastructure in this village, but nothing has changed. People are worried about the road damage that causes various accidents around here. The cost of hospital treatment due to an accident is also not cheap. The local government should think about the safety of the residents here due to the infrastructure that has not been repaired.” (AHY, X Village, 16/6/2019)
