Subject & Predicate / Fragments

1) Define -

- Subject - the person, place, thing, or idea that is doing or being
- Predicate - tells us what the subject does
- Fragment - a group of words that does not express a complete thought

2) Example - *The teacher is nice.*

- Subject - The teacher
- Predicate - is nice

3) Tips:

- Must have both parts!!!

PARTS OF SENTENCES I

Complete Subjects & Predicates Sentence or Fragment?

Complete Subjects & Predicates: A sentence is a group of words with two main parts: a complete subject and a complete predicate. Together these parts express a complete thought.

Complete Subjects	Complete Predicates
Everyone in our family	likes Mexican food.
The house down the street	has been for sale for months.
Fish	swim.

Fragments	Complete Sentences
Early Sunday afternoon The beautiful phoenix Rose from its own ashes	Our weekend guests left early Sunday afternoon. The beautiful phoenix was a mythical bird. The phoenix rose from its own ashes.
