Matthew wrote this about the sculpture:

This hand woven hemisphere is made from over three hundred metres of pure copper wire. The dendritic web's individual components rely on their neighbours as might the nerves of one's hand or the streams of a river delta. Accentuated depth, lamination and direction adds qualities of speed and flow to the surface. By graduating the strands very delicate structures can be formed using wire as fine as a hair. The surface has been acid stripped and plated with nickel to resist oxidation.

The centre of the from is a double skinned orb, behind it a comet's tail. From here the web rappels upwards and outwards to form a new perimeter cell wall. This structure is a portrait of potential energy and hopefully reflects the efforts of a man who has inspired others with his acts of kindness.
