Proposal:

It often spreads rapidly through the power of social media, with its influence and destructive power greatly amplified. If individuals cannot identify and resist fake news, it will affect the quality of public decision-making, damage the democratic process, and potentially negatively impact individuals and groups, such as inciting violence, discrimination, or political division. Therefore, enhancing awareness of the dangers of fake news is crucial for maintaining social stability, promoting healthy information circulation, and protecting the public's right to know. Purpose:

Benefit:

- Reduces Harm to Individuals and Communities:

Sometimes, fake news targets specific individuals or groups, causing reputational damage, psychological stress, and even threats to safety. Raising public awareness can help minimise such harm.

- Facilitates the Accurate Spread of Scientific and Health Information:

During public health crises (like the COVID-19 pandemic), fake news can hinder the implementation of effective disease prevention and control measures. Improving the public's ability to recognize fake news promotes the correct dissemination of scientific and health information, benefiting public health.

Conclusion:

- Enhancing public awareness and concern about fake news not only reduces the direct harm caused by misinformation but also promotes healthier societal development and individual growth on a broader scale.
- Through this research and practice, our entire team discovered that we had significantly underestimated the number and scope of areas and situations where fake news and misinformation biases exist in society. We believe this underestimation is not unique to us; it is likely that the majority of the public also shares this perception, perhaps even more so without realising it. This experience has enhanced our understanding of the extent and depth of our awareness of these issues.
- At the same time, we have come to understand some of the motives and reasons behind the production of fake news and misinformation. For example, manipulating market trends or public opinion to profit in the capital market or political elections. There are also instances where long-term dissemination of incorrect information alters public perception and opposition towards certain issues [Samantha Lai mentioned technology and the 2022 elections][Net politics mentioned the relationship between Europe's elections and disinformation], thereby enabling the passage or implementation of policies that are not necessarily in the public's best interest, among other things. - If we have the opportunity to further explore this topic in future projects, we are interested in incorporating street interviews to gather more data, thereby enriching the selection of topics for the Fake News Newspaper. We would also consider creating social media accounts for the Fake News Newspaper to engage with our audience and collect feedback.

Call to action:

Continually track and summarise fake news and misinformation on the QR provided in gazette to keep readers informed. Strive to engage a wide audience to increase awareness and subscriptions, thereby helping people uncover the subtle and pervasive presence of fake news in everyday life and enhance their understanding of the topic. Encourage contemplation on the origins and logic behind fake news production.
