COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to offer students with a good level of Greek language preparation the opportunity to read the original texts. The level of readings ranges from intermediate to advanced.

The course unit involves:

- 1. The accurate translation and linguistic comprehension of at least two books of The Odyssey;
- 2. Acquiring the particular features of Homeric Greek with a focus on the overlaps and differences between the dialects and
- 3. Systematic revision and development of the student's knowledge of Greek grammar and syntax through practice in analyzing, explaining, and reproducing Greek syntactic structures.

PRE-REQUISITES

A good knowledge of Greek morphology and syntax is essential for reading the original texts in Greek.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

At the end of the course, students should have gained a good knowledge of the peculiarities of the Homeric Greek style. They will also have acquired specific experience in translating Books 6, 7, and 8.

REQUIREMENTS
