Opening statement:

Multinational Corporations such as Nike or Apple and etc. put their investments into our struggle undeveloped poor countries which are in bad need of money. However the money going into our country doesn't always seems the way it looks. What these corporations actually try to do hide is that with this investment comes a requirements. The companies bargain with our countries for the investment. For the investment, it forces our country has to have little to none restrictions on how us workers are treated. But we have no choice to send them because the U.S CONSUMERS DEMAND MORE PRODUCTS. Workers can't even strike to form unions to fight against these major companies. Also the land is ripped apart trying to dig for the materials needed for the products. This is all for the US. Consummation.

Now before we end, we have accused everyone but the System of Profit. The System of Profit has placed the hungry and the need for money and consumption in the minds of the Us. Consumers, the Multinational Corporations, and the Poor Country Ruling Elite. The system has set up a way of thinking that profit is all you need and it doesn't matter how you get it as long as you have it. We the Poor country workers, are "peasants who work for them" as the Multinational Corporation stated. We are just a worthless tool used to fulfill greed. But by today, you shall know that we worth more, and we deserve more. You are nothing without us.

Defendants:

- Most of us don't make more than \$80 a month. Our conditions are terrible, usually with no running water, no kitchen to cook food. There are people in our village where they have younger

siblings, on the brink of death or already dead because they're starving. With the money that we make from the factory, it allows us to send some of that home to our families. (Bangladesh)

- Rather than an education, we have to work in the factory
- We're married off when we're teenagers, and have to support our families
- There aren't many job opportunities outside of the sweatshops
- Recently three factories owned by Puma, SE, and Adidas, more than 200 Cambodians have fainted due to poor working conditions.(Cambodia)
- Poor ventilation, strong chemicals
- With our poor wages, we cannot make a good living
- How has the ruling elite "soldout" the poor workers?
- Motivations for multinational corporations to locate in our country:
- It's for the support of our families, with minimal chances for other work, this is basically all we have
- (LOOK UP HOW OUR WORK COULD IMPROVE IF U.S. WORKERS DEMANDS FROM CORPORATIONS CHANGED)
- We have had national strikes, and anti-government protests. Even on April 17th, 18 unions plan to hold a week long strike, to almost double our monthly wages to \$160. The problem is we're usually suppressed by security forces.

A sweatshop is defined by the U.S. Department of Labor as a factory that violates 2 or more labor laws.

In developing countries, an estimated 250 million children ages 5 to 14 are forced to work. Because women make up 85 to 90% of sweatshop workers, employers force them to take birth control and routine pregnancy tests to avoid supporting maternity leave or providing appropriate health benefits. 85% of sweatshop workers are young women between the ages of 15-25. In order to meet the basic nutritional needs of their families, sweatshop workers spend between 50% to 75% of their income on food alone.

We are given wages that are below the price of living in our country. The average sweat shop worker is
