



Course Description:

English 105 (Comp I) is a dual credit course, offered with three credits through Eastern Iowa Community Colleges (EICC). Grammar Writing, the prerequisite to English 105, is a college bound writing class, designed for the student who wishes to prepare for the ACT exam and for college writing. During the first term, Grammar Writing, students will learn grammar to provide a basis for instruction in usage, mechanics, and concrete writing techniques. During the second term, English 105 (Comp I), the skills mastered will be used and reinforced in the writing process. Students will develop critical reading and thinking skills to analyze and evaluate information from diverse viewpoints. The course introduces documentation practices and information literacy skills. Students will write and revise at least four formal assignments and produce a minimum of 20 pages. At Bettendorf High School, students will fulfill the junior-senior writing requirement and earn one additional Language Arts elective credit. Students must earn a "C" or better to earn college credit.

Course Description:

This combined series of courses are dual-credit courses, offered with six credits through Eastern Iowa Community College (EICC). Students with a grade of "C" or better will earn three credits in Literature 101, Introduction to Literature, and three credits in English 106, Composition II. The first term, Lit 101 is an introduction to the major literary genres: the short story, poetry, drama, and the novel. Emphasis is placed on formal, thematic, historical, cultural, and critical elements of literature, as well as the relationship between literature and the human condition. The second term, English 106 (Composition II) is a continuation of Composition I. Students will analyze, synthesize, and evaluate texts. Critical thinking skills, argumentation, writing style, and academic research, introduced in Composition I, will also be further developed in this course. Students MAY ALSO elect to take the test in Advanced Placement English Literature and Composition, offered in May, which may directly qualify for college credit as determined by individual colleges and universities. Students who take AP exams may also qualify for additional benefits such as AP Scholar designations. Students must have heard a "C" or better in each prerequisite.

Lit 101 Term

- Analyze the impact of historical, cultural, and critical context on the formal and thematic elements of literary works.
- Illustrate the value of diversity through an exploration of literature.

- Write formal critical essays that evaluate literature, connect it to other works, incorporate personal experience, explore its contexts, and assess its relationship to the human condition.

- Analyze and evaluate rhetorical strategies in visual and written texts.
- Develop critical thinking skills to be able to analyze information and evaluate arguments from diverse viewpoints and multiple perspectives.

Course Description:

Students in this course learn to identify and produce various aspects of newspaper style and design. Students will learn how to prepare a story through planning questions or doing research prior to doing an interview. The course introduces the types of journalistic stories including news, features, editorials and reviews. Students will interview a variety of individuals as sources for articles. Newspaper writing students may have some writing published in the Growl or on bettgrowl.org and will have the option of enrolling in Publications the following term. Newspaper Writing is a required course for enrolling in Publications I.

Course Name MASS MEDIA AND CULTURE

Course Number 104211

Grade 11 - 12 Credit .5 Credit Length 1 Term

Prerequisite English 9 and 10

Course Description:

Mass Media and Culture, offered as a Language Arts elective, will focus on the power of the media in day-to-day living. Students will study social media, print, auditory, and visual media and explore the breadth and depth of the impact this media has on their lives. Critical analysis of social media, advertisements, movies, and music are required. Students complete a film project at the end of the term which serves as their final exam.

Course Description:

This class is responsible for producing The Growl, the school newspaper; and bettgrowl.org, the online newspaper; and The Beacon, the school yearbook. Students interested in applying for an editorship during their senior year must have taken Newspaper Writing and/or taken Publications for the entire school year. Students will plan the contents of the newspaper and yearbook, which includes the following:

- Newspaper -- researching, interviewing and writing news, feature and opinion articles, designing layout, taking and editing photographs with digital cameras, adding graphics and selling and designing advertising. The newspaper is published four times during the school year.
- Online -- students will learn the differences in writing for print vs. online; they will upload articles and photographs to the website on a regular basis (weekly).
- Yearbook -- designing pages, writing copy and captions, taking and editing photographs with digital cameras, and selling yearbooks, and/or sponsorships. The yearbook is distributed in the spring. Students interested in this course should be able to write well and manage time effectively. After-school time will be required. Publications I, II, and III are taught concurrently and are repeatable for up to 6 terms.



A willingness to participate and a personal investment are essential to the success of this course.
