Vale of White Horse District Council Briefly Declared War On Bordering Hamlet, Forgot Why

Vale of White Horse District, the country: Inside The Story

Vale of White Horse District, a place in the country (lat 51.67, long -1.42) that most outsiders could not point to on a map without first sighing, has become this week the latest entry in the slow-moving register of small communities behaving strangely under pressure. According to surviving meeting minutes, Vale of White Horse District formally declared war on a small bordering hamlet at some point in the 1970s.
