The programme aims to:	
A1	To enable the Nursing Associate Apprentice to become compassionate, competent, and confident nursing associates at academic level 5, qualified to deliver a wide range of clinical care and interpersonal skills underpinned by a systematic knowledge base.
A2	The Nursing Associate Apprentice will be able to practice safely and effectively within their parameters of practice, demonstrating appropriate values and behaviours in a wide range of health and care settings.
A3	To enable the Nursing Associate Apprentice to achieve all the requirements as stated in the NMC's 2023 Standards for Pre-Registration Nursing Associates. This also includes the Knowledge, Skills and Behaviours required as an apprentice under the NMC apprenticeship standard.

Lectures

Lectures will be the main form of delivery. This will ensure that you receive and take on board essential factual information to prepare you for the role of the nurse associate in the work-based learning environment. Lectures will be a mixture of face-to-face and virtual sessions. The principles of team-based learning will be developed in year one to start to develop problem solving skills, team working and communication skills for further development and application in year two. (K1-5)

Online study

Lectures will be supplemented, but not replaced by, online study materials and sessions, which will facilitate understanding of the professional requirements of the nursing associate role in order for you to develop the knowledge acquired through lectures further. This will be supported by discussions on Blackboard and during seminars. (K1-5 and S1-5)

Seminars

These are either staff or student led and are used throughout the programme but will vary depending on the module undertaken. They are designed to reinforce information imparted through lectures by allowing students to work through, analyse, understand, and respond to that information. They are used to enable students to make the link between theory and practice. Seminars will be a mixture of face-to-face and virtual.

When virtual, this will be via discussions on Blackboard as well as live discussions using Blackboard Collaborate. (K1-5 and S1-7)

Problem solving

Both individually and in small groups, these sessions will encourage critical reflection between theory and practice, in order to better prepare for undertaking the nursing associate role. (K1-5 and S1-7)

Tutorials

Will be utilised for pastoral discussion and personal development as well as academic support for assessed work. (K1-5 and S1-7)

Independent Study

Independent study is used: to assimilate and clarify material explored in lectures, to prepare for seminars, to prepare for assessments and to generally examine literature pertinent to the unit outcomes. (K 3-5 and S 1-7)

Clinical skills sessions

Evidence based practice sessions will be delivered by appropriately skilled teachers. The school has access to a clinical skills facility, and this is used to develop your clinical skills competence throughout the programme using simulation, Patients as Educators, and the experience of multiprofessional learning. (K3-5 and S1-7)

Practice Component

Practice Learning

You will spend a good deal of time in the work-based learning situation. You will be supported by appropriately prepared practice supervisors with whom you will work in order to develop your clinical practice. You will collate evidence to demonstrate learning and will be continually assessed in practice to strengthen the links between theory and evidence-based practice. All students are allocated an academic assessor at university, and a practice supervisor and practice assessor in the clinical setting. They will meet the student on a regular basis at pre-arranged times which provides the opportunity to discuss the student's academic and clinical progress, both face-to-face and digitally. Assessment Methods

We utilise a variety of assessment methods throughout the programme which include:

- a 2000-word essay exploring the critical role of academic skills and digital literacy in contemporary healthcare.
- a practical assessment with the University's Patients as Educators which prepares you to interact and communicate with patients, plus a personal reflection essay on the importance of good communication in nurse-patient interactions.
- multiple choice anatomy and physiology exams.
- a 2000-word case study plus an infographic based on a patient of your choice from your clinical practice area.
- the development of an educational resource aimed at patients or carers to assist in the self-management of a long-term condition plus a 10-minute presentation discussing the condition chosen and how the educational resource will support the patient/carers to manage their condition.
- health numeracy exam utilising a software platform called Safemedicate to prepare you for the administration of medications in the healthcare environment.

- a recorded 10-minute digital presentation using PowerPoint discussing a specific medication and its application within a specific patient scenario which you will choose from a predetermined list.
- a 2000-word assignment discussing the importance of evidence-based practice within the role of the nursing associate.
- a 3000-word assignment discussing an aspect of risk within your clinical practice setting, plus the development and presentation of a conference-quality poster on the topic of your assignment.
- completion of clinical practice documentation using an e-portfolio where the achievement of all practice-related assessments and proficiencies is documented.

Feedback methods

You will receive feedback on your written work and your practical assessments/presentation in a variety of formats, including in-text comments and an overall summary of your work which may be written and/or via voice recording. This summary is divided into sections which include what you have done well, and a guide as to how you can improve, providing you with recommendations as to how you achieve this. As an example, this could include information on arranging tutorial support with our Academic Study Skills Centre. Tutorial support from the module lead is also available as needed and is actively encouraged.

For the MCQ A&P exams and the Safemedicate exam, the correct answer will be provided following the marking of the exams. This will enable you to identify any errors made and allow you to review the teaching material to further your learning. Tutorial support is also available to assist with any additional explanation or teaching tools which may help you.

For the clinical practice e-portfolio your Practice Supervisors and Practice Assessors will provide written feedback throughout and will also meet with you to discuss this feedback during a series of practice-related professional discussions.
