

Version

If the source identifies that it is a specific version of a work that has been released in other forms, make sure to include the version in your works cited entry. Books are often release in versions referred to as editions. This could include a numbered edition, a revised edition or another description (*MLA Handbook* 38-39). End this element with a comma

How to Cite a Version in a Works Cited Entry (*MLA Handbook* 107)

- Write ordinal numbers with arabic numerals (2nd, 38th)
- Abbreviate revised (rev.)
- Abbreviate edition (ed.)
- Descriptive terms for versions are written in all lowercase
- Proper nouns are capitalized

Republished Books

Books may be republished due to popularity and are not considered a new edition. New editions are usually revisions of the original. For books that were originally published at an earlier date and have been republished at a later one, insert the original publication date before the publication information.
