<p>At least one group session per week delivered in Rochdale for LGB&T young people</p>	<p>There was a consultation on providing a weekly group for young LGB&T people in the Borough. Research conducted through survey/anecdotal evidence revealed that young people preferred one to one support. Only one young person attended the consultation on 29/10/2010. This young person was kept informed of project developments.</p> <p>It was decided to set-up a small project group to work towards producing a pocket information guide for young LGB&T people who reside in the Borough of Rochdale. There was a consultation session at RCT on 12/01/2011. There were four young people who attended the project group and a lot of interest in this group, but many young people who made contact, entered employment, training or education and the RCT group unfortunately, did not meet again.</p> <p>The minutes from the consultation session</p>

	<p>were transcribed and key themes to be included in the guide emerged. The LGB&T Information and Participation Worker began gathering information on the themes/topics and began composing a working document of content to be included in the guide.</p> <p>It was decided to work in collaboration with Hopwood Hall College and use a focus group to develop the Pocket Information Guide. The focus group consisting of 10 young people met once for 2 hours and the working document of contents was peer-reviewed among students (16 to years old) who identify as LGB&T and edited to adapt to the size of the guide. A semi-final draft of content to be included in the guide was developed.</p>

Heywood, Middleton and Rochdale: Young People's Services

LGF services - headlines from April-December 2010:

- At least 500 people aware of LGF campaigns in Heywood, Middleton & Rochdale based on Outnorthwest circulation figures.
- Approximately 264 Heywood, Middleton & Rochdale residents visiting the gay village would also have been aware of campaigns (based on Outnorthwest circulation figures & the LGF's Village Census data).
- 3 people accessed counselling from Heywood, Middleton & Rochdale.
- 1188 gay men's safer sex packs were distributed in the locality. (Each pack contains two Durex Elite condoms, and two sachets of 10ml Durex Play water based lube)
- 521 unique visits to the LGF website from residents in Heywood, Middleton & Rochdale, accessing a range of information, resources and news items regarding a range of issues, such as sexual health information, mental health, substance misuse and equality issues.

National Statistics:

4 in 5 young people have no access to LGBT resources to help them (Hunt, R. & Jensen J., The experiences of young gay people in Britain's schools, Stonewall, 2006)

Over half of young people (straight & LGBT) feel that the attitude to sexuality in school has negatively affected their development (Homophobic bullying & human rights, IARS 2008)

1 in 4 trans young people experiences physical abuse at school (Al-Alami M., Turner L. & Whittle S, Engendered Penalties: Transgender and transsexual people's experiences of inequality and discrimination 2007)

2 in 3 victims reporting hate crime were not referred to or informed about any support or advice services available to them (Dick S. Homophobic hate crime: The gay British crime survey, Stonewall, 2008)

3 in 4 LGB people would prefer an LGB specialist mental health worker (Williams S. Bradford & District LGB Health Needs Assessment, 2007)

3 in 5 respondents would like an LGBT-specific alcohol service (Browne, K Count Me In Too: LGBT Lives in Brighton & Hove, Drugs and Alcohol, University of Brighton and Spectrum, 2009)

Nearly 6 in 10 clients stated that their reason for specifically attending the LGF clinic was "It's a service aimed specifically at the LGB community"(Hughes, B. & Ledger, J. Leading the Way& A unique partnership approach to sexual health services for lesbians, gay and bisexual men, 2006)

9 in 10 LGB people would prefer an LGB specialist sexual health worker (Williams S. Bradford & District LGB Health Needs Assessment, 2007)

Young lesbian and gay people are two and a half times more likely to go to a gay-friendly pub and club rather than a youth group (Hunt, R. and Jensen, J. The School Report: The experiences of young gay people in Britain's Schools Stonewall: London, 2007)

Young people who attend youth groups are 37% more likely to feel that there is an adult at home they can talk to about being gay, and 32% more likely to feel there is an adult at school they can talk to (Hunt, R. and Jensen, J. The School Report: The experiences of young gay people in Britain's Schools Stonewall: London, 2007)

Only 15% of young lesbian, gay and bisexual people have attended a gay youth group (Hunt, R. and Jensen, J. The School Report: The experiences of young gay people in Britain's Schools Stonewall: London, 2007)

3 in 4 LGBT youth feigned illness or played truant to avoid homophobic bullying - the majority of these left school at 16 (Rivers I, Social exclusion, absenteeism and sexual minority youth, 2000)

Only 6% of schools have a group specifically for lesbian and gay pupils and their friends (Hunt, R. and Jensen, J. The School Report: The experiences of young gay people in Britain's Schools, Stonewall 2007)

Just over 2 in 5 LGB students and just under 2 in 5 trans students had been bullied at school (The experience of lesbian, gay, bisexual and trans staff and students in higher education, Research report, Equality Challenge Unit, 2009)
