
Why use **mote** transcription? 🤔

Our research shows that many people like having the ability to both read and hear feedback. For example, listening to feedback can really help with communicating a complex idea the first time around. Being able to also read that complex idea can help the other person to apply that complex idea in their work, or to revise their learning at a later date.

In addition, with **mote**, you can translate your voice note so that your audience can hear your feedback in your native language and read your feedback in their own native language.

Try transcription today

Just click the **mote** M icon in your browser bar to access the menu options, and then select 'Enable voice transcription'. See below for details, and click the puzzle (🧩) icon if you don't see the **mote** icon.



## A history of San Francisco sourdough bread

When James W Marshall discovered gold in the hills north of San Francisco in 1848, it sparked a migration of epic proportions. Within a year, tens of thousands of immigrants from both across the country and around the globe had relocated to the Californian city and its surroundings, carrying with them basic necessities like clothing; carpentry tools; and coffee, sugar and flour. However, there was one staple item that would become a part of the city's history forever: starter for bread.

In a place where nourishment was scarce, bread starter (a dough that has fermented using naturally occurring bacteria and yeast) was a prized possession during the California Gold Rush, allowing miners to turn drab flour into loaves that were both nutritious and delicious. Somehow, the bread tasted tangier and more flavourful than it did elsewhere, and so San Francisco sourdough was born.

It's really easy to add transcription, or change transcription language - just click the 'M' **mote** logo in your browser bar. (If you can't see the **mote** 'M' icon, try clicking on the puzzle  icon, and then 'pin' our icon to your browser bar.)



## Pro Tip #2 - Preview your audio + transcript before posting

Once you've hit 'DONE' after finishing your recording, you'll see some text, and a purple button. In Google Classroom Private Comments, it will look like the one below, but in other apps it may look a bit different. If you click this, you'll be able to preview and edit your voice note before posting it.




## Pro Tip #3 - Save voice notes to your 'motebook'
