Higher Education & Training Options for Students with Disabilities

Seeking further education and training after high school is an effective way to begin transitioning into life after high school for students with disabilities. Though individuals with disabilities may face additional obstacles, there are numerous resources designed to help them. Students should be aware that after high school, assistance is based on self-reporting of disabilities. Therefore, students should consider contacting the Disability Services office or responsible person at their respective institution, reporting their disability, and discussing possible means of assistance. Local and state higher education and training institutions are listed below.

Federal Student Aid

Federal Student Aid, part of the U.S. Department of Education, provides financial aid to students pursuing postsecondary education. Schools in Michigan

College is a time of transition for students. Students with disabilities face the same challenges as every student, plus additional challenges related to certain limitations their disability may cause. Services and support are available on most campuses for students who have a documented disability which significantly affects major life functions. Students with disabilities are highly encouraged to contact Student Disability Services to register or apply for services if:

- They have a documented disability that significantly affects major life functions
- They had an Individualized Education Program (IEP) in high school
- They are a client of Vocational Rehabilitation, Commission for the Blind, or other related agency
- They were registered with Disability Services at another college

Central Michigan University

Central Michigan University offers Bachelor and graduate degree programs. If a student requires assistance CMU usually has two RA's (Resident Assistant/Advisor) per floor. They also have a main reception desk that is staffed 24 hours per day. Finally, students typically have two or three roommates. The campus is rectangular in shape; therefore it is easy to navigate. The student will have the option to choose between North/South dorms based on the location of their classes. CMU will give students with disabilities extended time to take an exam.

Delta College

Delta College is a community college which features a wide range of certificate and degree programs. These programs can prepare students for a career or allow them to transition to a university. Delta is fully enclosed and consists of a square with wings for classrooms. It is fully accessible including door assist buttons and elevators. If a student is registered with the Office of Disability Resources (ODR) and it is determined that extended time for testing is a reasonable accommodation, the ODR will give letters of accommodation to the student so they can present to the faculty. The faculty will then provide the accommodation.

Michigan State University

Michigan State University offers Bachelor and graduate degree programs. Each student is unique and their needs will vary. Accommodations are determined during a confidential needs assessment with a Disability Specialist. Accessible housing options can be discussed with a Disability Specialist to determine which housing option will meet the student's needs. The Capital Area Transportation Authority (CATA) provides fixed route services on and off campus, covering all of Ingham County. CATA buses are equipped with ramps or lifts, and run every 7 to 35 minutes depending on the route. CATA also provides a curb-to-curb, advanced reservation (1 day prior) transit service for persons with disabilities.

Mott Community College

Mott Community College is located in Flint and is a community college which features a wide range of certificate and degree programs. These programs can prepare students for a career or allow them to transition to a university. MCC has a federally funded program called TRiO-SSS which supports and encourages students who are heading toward a four year institution. Qualifying students must be academically disadvantaged and: demonstrate a commitment/ability to transfer and obtain a Bachelor's degree, meet income guidelines, be a first generation student and/or have a **documented disability**. MCC will provide accommodation to students for extended testing periods if necessary; these accommodations are made on a case-by-case basis.

Saginaw Valley State University offers Bachelor and graduate degree programs, as well as graduate certificates. SVSU's classroom buildings are connected in two different clusters, so individuals can stay in-doors and avoid walking in the snow or rain between classes. Students can request with Housing which building they would like to live in and who they would like to live with. RA's are on call each night in the dorm rooms, and there is always a Resident Director available. Additional modifications to dorms can be made if necessary and the student may live with a roommate. Students with disabilities who qualify can receive extra time to take exams.
