



Learning with Zoom: A Student Guide

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What is Zoom?

Zoom is ASU's centrally supported, easy-to-use video conferencing platform that provides high definition, interactive collaboration tools, and telephone conferencing to use for communication and collaboration.

Learning in Zoom you can:

- Learn with up to 300 students simultaneously
- Watch your instructor's screen and share your screen with the class
- Annotate and mark on the screen
- Diagram and draw on a whiteboard
- Break into groups for discussions or projects
- Chat with the whole class or individuals to share questions or learning resources

How do I join a class in Zoom?

You will be prompted to join the class Zoom session through any of the following methods: email from your teacher, a link to the session in a Canvas Announcement, a link in the class syllabus, and/or a calendar invite.



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What equipment do I need to get started?

At the most basic level, all you need to use Zoom is a telephone, *even a landline*. However, if you have access to a computer or mobile device you can use the full capabilities of Zoom.

The following equipment will enhance your experience but is **not** necessary:

1. **Web camera**

A camera will increase your connection with your instructor and your peers by allowing you to see each other face-to-face. If you do not have access to a web camera, you will still be able to participate in the other features of the Zoom class.

2. **Headset with a microphone**

This will let you hear and be heard more clearly. This does not need to be fancy equipment, it can be the same as the headphones you might use with your phone.

3. **Charger**

Charging your device during class will ensure that you do not have an unexpected power outage interrupting your learning.

What are we going to do in class?

Start class off right with some basic Zoom etiquette:

- come dressed for class
- turn on your camera (if you feel comfortable with that or it is required by your teacher)
- use a virtual background to share your camera but not your home - or have a background you are ok sharing...
- look at the camera in order to make eye contact when you're talking
- mute your microphone when you aren't contributing
