VIDEO PRODUCTION

Course Description

Video Production is an entry-level course that will focus mostly on the genre of short films made by youth in the 21st century. Short films are often created for screening at film festivals, they are experimental and unconventional in style. During this class each student will develop a basic understanding of camera operations, framing a moving image, recording, and editing audio and video for story telling. To gather inspiration and develop the language of video and film we will watch critically analyze short films and videos created by artists in the world of art, contemporary youth and the commercial world. The goal is to expand knowledge, understanding, and appreciation for video production and art of making it.

GOALS

- Develop a basic understanding and language for video production and creative concepts with it.
- Demonstrate basic <u>Technical and Conceptual Skills</u> (Assessment Rubrics)
- Make a 3-5 min short in the genre and aesthetic of their choice.
- Engage in critical and constructive dialogue, analysis, and feedback when viewing video art.
- Present/ screen their video work in front of a wider audience.

ELEMENTS OF THE CLASS

- Critical Thinking Watching and discussing short films
- Generating Ideas and Planning Sketchbook, calendar, weekends, etc.
- Creating and Sharing (*on assigned due dates)
- Asking for help / Stepping up for others Collaboration and Teamwork is what video production is all about.
