



Tobacco Control Provisions Passed

- NY will prohibit the sale of **flavored vapor products** used in e-cigarettes with the only exception being tobacco flavored, unless and until the FDA approves the product through its premarket review process.

As of July 1, 2020,

- Pharmacies in NY will no longer be allowed to sell any tobacco products including vaping products. This will apply to all free-standing pharmacies and to any retail store that has a pharmacy within it.
- Tobacco and vapor retailers will no longer be allowed to accept coupons and or discount the price of tobacco through typical price reduction measures, effectively raising the price paid for tobacco products.
- New restrictions on the delivery of vapor products only to licensed manufacturers or retailers will end online sales of vapor products delivered to private residences.
- NY will now prohibit the outdoor display of tobacco and e-cigarette advertisements and paraphernalia in storefronts or windows within 1,500 feet of a school outside New York City and within 500 feet of a school in New York City.
- Fines for selling tobacco products to underage purchasers have been increased.
- Vaping product manufacturers will be required to disclose all ingredients and by-products in their e-cigarettes and heavy metals within any heating elements they manufacture. They are required to report those results to the Health Department and publish them on their own public websites.
- A vaping prevention awareness program aimed at students will be coordinated between the state Commissioners of Health and Education. Note that some of this work has already begun as a result of a Governor's Executive Order last year.

Due to concerns about vaping and lung illness:

- NY's Commissioner of Health is authorized to publish rules on the use of carrier oils in vaping products that are deemed to be a danger to the public and a chemical of concern.
