Wednesday is the day of the Autumn Budget and nobody can say for certain what to expect - even the chancellor doesn't seem to know, U-turning almost daily in search of a least-worst option.

What is certain, however, is she wants to find £20-30 billion, through cuts and tax rises, and a common feature of all her proposals has been a determination to make the working-class pay. The Swansea West MP, Torsten Bell, is playing a key role in shaping the budget. Two months ago, his office said he was too busy to meet with us to hear our concerns. After the budget, Bell should meet with the communities affected and explain himself to them.

On Saturday, at 1pm, various community campaign groups, including disabled people, pensioners, students, Swansea Trades Council, and other trade unionists, will hold a budget protest at Swansea Castle.


We invite Mr. Bell to meet us there. We want a respectful debate over his political choices, and the crisis of working-class political representation he exemplifies.
