### Ann Lui, Future Firm

Mobile gallery in the back of a trailer -- pop-up public space

We shouldn't point to the space and the plaza

Interested in exploring how infrastructure supports galleries?

Circus as a model to create a framework to gather and organize -- there are more places than the "city square" that is "public space"; Reddit is a kind of public space.

Spectacle-driven circus is

[Storefront for Art and Architecture](#) in NYC served as a platform to test this project: The team won a competition organized by this organization.

Infiltration device -- that idea became the curatorial

There were 10 exhibitions around the world, including Greece, Dominican Republic, Buffalo. Ours [where?] was on a trailer behind a truck. We built a circus in a warehouse in East Boston, which is the neighborhood adjacent to the airport.

The team used Kickstarter to finance architecture/intervention projects (raised ~\$11,000, but spent \$30,000 between the traveling and programming of the project).

They operate in this interstitial territory: e.g. insurance company did NOT know how to treat the project -- not a building, not a traditional gallery.

Finding a place to build this type of projects is also challenge -- as part of the considerations.

"We were interested in why the "mobile" and the "pop-up" projects were back in fashion (?). We thought these type of projects were the response to the frustration with existing institutions -- post-recession feeling. Sometimes it is worth pursuing other avenues to make projects happen (re: funding)"

Four designers who were in the cities the Circus visited spoke about their work -- from extra large scale (landscape) to small scale (furniture solving). The visited cities were Ithaca, Buffalo, Boston and New York.

Circus was imagined as a technological wonder (e.g. push a button where everything opens), but it happened to be theatrically inconvenient (super analog).

East Boston - in the news recently for the "G" word (gentrification) because its housing is affordable and it's relatively close to downtown.

"We always see ourselves as outsiders -- whenever we see an event happening, we have some form of (project) reaction" For examples, editorial, installation, programs.

"In retrospect I wish there would have been more time to plan and connect with the local communities where the Circus traveling --I guess the reflection is us reflect on what the loopholes and the spaces in between where projects"

## **Rich Alapack, We All Live Here (WALH)**

Create something so we all get along.

White Sox and Cubs baseball fans - "beat each other up because they wear different logos"

No rivalry

Art, community, technology - and start with kids

Build a generation that reject these thoughts about racism entirely

ACT: Go to schools, discuss what students like, what their school is trying to do (teach kids a second language, maybe they're trying to integrate different populations)

The project teaches graphic and design skills to produce objects that help to finance the program/projects and improvements in their own schools.

Pulaski International School -- "we are live here" in four different language: English and Spanish (because of the current demographics of the neighborhood); and German and Polish because of the former communities that historically lived in the neighborhood.

How can we connect more wealthy schools with less resources -- collaborative projects may be a platform to do so.

Eduardo Kobra, Brazil - he is a graffiti artist with the largest body of work. He was featured in the Rio Olympics.  
Case Maclaim, Germany -

Marina Zumi, Argentina - Wabash Corridor (paints endangered species)

Cyrcle, USA - only includes US artists now
