Documenting Our Learning with Digital Learning Portfolios

For the third trimester, we will create digital portfolios as a way to document our learning. What is a digital portfolio?

An important part of the learning process is reflection. Thinking about your thinking (metacognition) gives you the chance to capture the flow of your learning and deepen your understanding of both content and yourself. To make learning come alive, we will collect artifacts this trimester to document our learning journey.

So what will you be capturing to put in this digital learning portfolio? Well, for one, you'll be asking yourself these questions to help guide you:

- How can I tell the story of my learning?
- What does my learning mean to me and to the world around me?
- Why is my work important and how is it related to other people and other work?
- How is my learning today different from my learning last week/month?

Here, then, are the specifics of what you will add to your digital learning portfolio:

Front Page

- Name of Portfolio
- Welcome message
- Who you are as a learner
- Table of Contents

Learning Pages

- Key reading experiences
- Key writing experiences
- Any artifact that reflects who you are as a learner.
- I Can Statement

**Mrs. Harrod and Mrs. Overbeek will let you know when an assignment should be added to your digital learning portfolio.

Each page should contain:

- A short summary of what learning is documented on the page
- The contents of your learning
- A reflection of your learning after completing the experience

Other requirements:

Correct spelling

- Correct punctuation
- Correct grammar
