What is my child learning at school?	Every school in North Carolina must follow the Standard Course of Study, determined by the State Board of Education. These guidelines outline the knowledge and skills that students are expected to know by the end of each grade/course.
How can a parent review these materials?	The NCDPI Office of Academic Standards website included standards for various subjects such as:  • Arts Education • Career Technical Education • Computer Science • English Language Arts • English Language Development • Student Success Standards • Healthful Living • Information and Technology • Mathematics • Science



The instructional modality is whole group explicit direct grade level, standard based instruction, and small group data driven instruction. The students, after receiving standards based whole group instruction; are grouped by academic skill level and rotate amongst centers specifically designed to support academic growth and remediate learning gaps in each core block. The school adheres to a whole group instructional model that follows an "I Do, We Do, We Do, You Do, and assessment" format. The assessment acts as a progress monitoring tool to inform and drive instruction in both whole group and small group the following week. The student groups work independently on specific tasks designed to build academic skills. They also work with the teacher daily to gain skills and conceptual understanding. The master schedule includes a Leadership block, data driven teaching block. Instructional technology is used in every core class and throughout the day. Students are also privileged to enjoy foreign language and music classes.

The curriculum products used include Ready and Eureka Math, HMH Into Reading, Ready Reading, iReady, McGraw-Hill, RAZ-Plus, Zearn, and Lexia Learning.

#### MATH

In Kindergarten through 8<sup>th</sup> grade the students use Ready Math. Ready Math helps teachers create a rich classroom environment in which students at all levels become active, real-world problem solvers. Through teacher-led instruction, students develop mathematical reasoning, engage in discourse, and build strong mathematical habits.

#### **READING**

In Kindergarten through 2<sup>nd</sup> grade students use HMH Into Reading. HMH is a research-backed program based on the science of reading that has embedded metrics, scaffolds, and standards. The robust assessment gives teachers accurate data to differentiate reading instruction. HMH builds confident readers as they build automaticity and fluency with a bank of text they can read independently. The rich culturally responsive texts promote student engagement and increase student outcomes.



In 3<sup>rd</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> grade students use Ready reading lessons scaffolded to build students' confidence as they develop important critical thinking and analytical skills. Through ELA instruction, students are immediately engaged by the variety of real-world source texts, from ELA books to literature and poetry to blogs and news articles.

Additionally, students are engaged in project-based learning through regular classroom hands on projects and 4 major school wide projects designed to hone their skills and deepen their understanding of the academic content. We also provide an extended day; which is an academic offering for all students where we double down on teaching academic skills and concepts through small group instruction after school hours. We offer Saturday Academy for students in 3<sup>rd</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> grade and summer sessions for all students.

We provide our students with one-to-one laptops, and hotspots for working from home. We provide them opportunities to engage in leadership classes, foreign language and music classes. Instructional technology is a part of every lesson in every classroom. All teachers have been provided and trained on the use of VIBE Boards, which are interactive white board monitors that allow teachers to deliver innovative lessons and real-world experiences to the classroom.

#### **SUPPLEMENTAL RESOURCES**

Our teachers use Eureka Math, Lexia Learning, Raz-Plus, Mystery Science, Discovery Education, Quizizz, EdPuzzle, Flocabulary, Nearpod, Zearn, IXL, Quizalize, and IREADY Diagnostics as supplemental resources to support the core curriculum.



How will a parent learn about my child's progress in school or with a class?

IDYL believes that open communication between school and home improves the quality of the educational experience. Every marking period, parents receive detailed written reports of student performance and accomplishments. These reports are coupled with fall and spring parent-teacher conferences. The reports and conferences include interpretation of internal and external measures of assessment. Teachers and parents may also schedule additional meetings.

At all other times throughout the year, parents can use DOJO to discuss child's grades and progress with teachers. As well as log on to IREADY to see their child's progress.

	Local assessments  Quarterly report cards which detail grades, attendance, and assessment are distributed as specified in the school calendar. Parents can access and monitor their child's progress in school, obtain information on assessment results, and more through the scheduled parent conferences.  State Assessments  Individual Student Reports for end-of-grade/course tests and other state assessments (English language proficiency assessment) are accessible upon requests.  In NC, all students take end-of-grade assessments for reading and math in grades 3-8. Students take end-of grade science assessments in grades 5 and 8.
What are the qualifications of my child's teachers?	All classroom teachers at IDYL holds a minimum of a Bachelor's degree and 3 or more years of teaching.



# What are the requirements for school enrollment?

#### **Enrollment Requirements**

To enroll in IDYL charter school, your child must be a North Carolina resident, be eligible for public school, and meet any age requirements for the grade level. There are no academic prerequisites, selective admissions, or tuition fees. After admission, you'll need to submit documents including a birth certificate, proof of residency, a parent's photo ID, and current health and immunization records.

How can a parent help their child develop citizenship, social skills, and respect for others? We believe that a strong moral identity is foundational to student success. We strive not only to support the virtues parents try to instill at home but also to explicitly teach students the skills, behaviors, and virtues necessary for leading an ethical life through direct daily lessons designed to develop social and emotional competencies.

IDYL's values are I- integrity, *D-determined*, *Y-yearning to L-lead*. Students learn to internalize these virtues because we intentionally and consistently apply Moral Focus concepts throughout all aspects of school life. This integration is essential for students to learn the importance of developing and maintaining strong

personal character. To support this effort, we create a learning environment built on a foundation of respect and care, a milieu in which everyone works hard to achieve academic goals and improve school culture. The Moral Focus program is an essential part of every student's education.

Moral Focus lessons are being taught throughout each day with students. The expectation is that all students are able to define, provide examples, and live out the Moral Focus virtues in all areas of their lives. At home, you can support by reviewing the virtues, definitions, and examples as well as finding ways to exhibit those expectations at home. Having a reward system, tracking positive Moral Focus behaviors, not only in your home, but also in your community, will prove to be extremely beneficial. Creating space and opportunity for this is key. Showing your child the value of living these out in all areas of life will encourage your child to lead an ethical life.

Additional ways you can support your child in developing citizenship, social skills, and respect for others include:

- Reviewing SEL lessons, and activities that are online or sent home pertaining to our moral focus instructions and lessons.
- Communicating with your scholar's teacher in order to reinforce each Week's moral focus virtue.



How can I help establish high expectations for my child's success in school?

In addition to preparing our students for academic success, we seek to develop a strong sense of responsibility in each child. We want students to take personal ownership of their success or failure, regardless of their background or previous experiences. This includes sound decision-making, an ability that is becoming critical in our ever-changing, complex world. Students must meet high expectations both academically and behaviorally. Our teachers work with students and parents to promote the responsibility necessary for success both in and out of school.



Strengthening a child's realization of high expectations and fostering a commitment to lifelong learning involves creating a supportive and motivating environment.

We believe that open communication between school and home improves the quality of the educational experience. Parents and family members of students are vital contributors in the education of their children. The school will ensure that all parents/guardians are involved in our school in a meaningful manner in order to improve student academic achievement. Two-way communication between the school and home, both verbal and written, provides a sound base for a good partnership to provide an effective educational program for all students. Full realization of the partnership will be achieved through on-going commitment and active participation by both home and school.

Every marking period, parents receive detailed written reports of student performance and accomplishments. These reports are coupled with fall and spring parent-teacher conferences. The reports and conferences include interpretation of internal and external measures of assessment. Teachers and parents may also schedule additional meetings.



How can a parent strengthen communication with the school/teacher?

Effective communication between the school and home is vital to the successful academic, emotional, and social well-being of students. To keep parents informed of school events and student growth, the school communicates often with parents through email newsletters, telephone calls, texts, DOJO and individual and group meetings.

IDYL uses a range of events and communications vehicles to share information with parents and give them opportunities to offer feedback. This includes:

 Newsletters: The school publishes a monthly newsletter for families to provide updates on current events and programmatic developments.



- Social Media: The school maintains a strong, user-friendly website to give parents access to information
  on the school and on their children's experience at the school. The school also takes advantage of
  Facebook and Instagram, with the goal of further strengthening connections among school leaders,
  teachers, and family members.
- Classroom Communication: Teachers regularly give students information to take home to their parents. Examples include weekly updates and take-home folders with classroom-specific information. Teachers also give parents regular reports on their students' progress using letters, online communications, phone calls, texts, and/or face-to-face meetings.
- Parent Meetings: The school regularly schedules parent information sessions so parents can learn what their students are doing and learning in school. In addition, the teachers conduct parent teacher conferences to discuss student's academic progress with parents.
- In addition DOJO can be used to access their child's academic information, families can also use it as a resource for many uses including filling out forms, emailing their children's teachers, receiving important notifications, and viewing information about school events.
- *CallMultiplier*. The school utilizes CallMultiplier to provide families with important school information including upcoming events, school closures, etc.
- Family Nights: We schedule various social and educational events during the school year to strengthen relationships among students, parents, teachers, and administrators.
- Parent Survey: Each fall and spring, the school conducts a parent satisfaction survey to gather feedback from parents.

IDYL is a charter school. Charter schools are public schools of choice that are authorized by the State Board of Education and operated by independent non-profit boards of directors. State and local tax dollars are the primary funding sources for charter schools, which have open enrollment and cannot discriminate in admissions, associate with any religion or religious group, or charge-tuition.

What immunizations are required and when should they be scheduled?

**Influenza** is a virus spread from infected persons to the nose or throat of another. Influenza can cause fever, sore throat, chills, coughs, headache, and muscle aches. A yearly vaccination is available.

**Meningococcal disease** is a serious illness caused by bacteria. It is an infection of the brain and spinal cord coverings and can cause blood infections. The vaccine for this is required for individuals entering 7th grade or by the age of 12.
