

I have no idea whether or not this is just a “me” problem (or honestly it’s probably just my OCD messing me up like normal), but I definitely dislike the thought of getting lash glue anywhere near my eyes.

In light of this, I decided to try several different alternatives on the market, and this article is all about how they measured up!

Without further ado. . .

### **#1: Magnetic Lashes w/ Liner**



These ended up being my personal favorite! They were very simple to apply, and stayed on well throughout the day. This is purely my own preference, but these lashes looked nice and, being accent lashes, were a good size and shape.

Pros: Easy application, good wear, worked as advertised, plenty of different styles available.

Cons: Layers take time to dry, each time you buy, you have to get a new eyeliner, too, so not the cheapest, difficult to take off and reapply.

### **#2: Normal Lashes w/ 2-in-1 Lash Glue + Liner**



Honestly, a really good idea! The liner can be used with any pair of normal lashes, which allows you to get any pair you want. I didn't end up wearing this all-day, because I ended up not liking the style of lashes on my eyes (oops). However, the liner itself was alright. I wouldn't use it for say, winged liner, though, because the liner itself dries sticky.

Plus, the liner itself is *super* difficult to take off. Even after scrubbing most of it off, some *\*still\** stayed on through two days, no matter what I used and how much I used.

Pros: Simple application, similar to normal glue, can use any lashes that you want to with product.

Cons: Dries "sticky" on eyes, has some "traditional" glue problems like getting eyelids stuck, very difficult to remove the eyeliner.

### #3: Magnetic Lashes w/ Applicator Tool



These are my least favorite because I could just. Not. Get. Them. On. I tried a ton of different ways, but I couldn't get them on comfortably or properly using the tool. It could just be me, but whatever I tried simply did not work. After each attempt, I also had to readjust the lashes on the tool, which took extra time.

Pros: Would (most likely) stay on longer, layers nicely.

Cons: Difficult to apply and adjust, takes extra precision and time to try to get on.

In the end, I'd probably stick with the first two options. They were the most comfortable, easiest options out of the three, specifically the first, and that makes them a good option for day-to-day wear!
