I don't mean to sound flippant, but I feel that I've lived two lifetimes---*before* and *after* my surprise divorce in 1995. From 1971 (the year I married) to '95, my life was filled with helping my husband through medical school, rearing three daughters, teaching for short stints (2-3 years at a time) and traveling to many wonderful places. Some years ago I returned to singing in a choir, which has always brought me tremendous joy, but which I took a LONG hiatus for many years.

My trips these days are to the Carolinas (both North and South) to visit my three married daughters and their families, including three granddaughters (ages 4, almost 4 and 6 months). It is with great joy and sense of pride that I watch these new generations carry on the cycle of life so beautifully and with such care and devotion. Relationships have always been important to me, but now I'm much more inclusive. My church "family" and friends also bring tremendous fulfillment, as each day offers new surprises and challenges.

I thank all of you who have had a role in organizing this fantastic reunion (my 1st). It has taken a TREMENDOUS amount of effort to plan and coordinate, but I know the fruits of your labor will be abundant indeed. Looking forward to reconnecting with all of you.
