Quotes from Students about the Panel:

"As a spiritual thinker and aspiring scientist, I was moved by the connections our speakers made between the two. They pointed out the irony of Western science in its attempts to isolate specific elements of a complex system, our inability to perceive with our limited senses, and the numbing environment in which science most often takes place which strips us of our curiosity. This validated my belief that whimsy has its place in the quest for empirical understanding. We must reach beyond the limitations of our human capacity for knowing, and seek others to guide us through the puzzle



of nature. Not being able to have the answers does not mean we cannot learn or should not attempt to do so. There are lessons we can learn without having to know the *why* behind every little thing. Other beings hold answers we may never arrive to, but they also have lessons for us to help guide us towards harmony with our environment. Skywoman did not pick apart her animal friends, did not isolate them, nor did she ask them for all the answers. She asked them to show her the way and to share their unique talents with her in order to shape the world into what it is. *This* is how we listen, and *this* is how we learn."

"As I learn about the impact of losing one's identity, I find myself seeking people, such as last night's panelists, to lead the journey for their recovery. I think every student should be given the opportunity to be reached through physical contact with nature. If we are to be involved in the healing process, as the panelists propose, then we need to stop being told how and what to teach by oppressive systems and embrace holistic methods that speak to a person's heart."

"wow wow wow. what a panel that was. I was honestly really emotional during some parts of it and violently sobbed for 4 hours after everything was all said and done eric. This panel, while amazing to sit in and listen to, brought up so many feelings and thoughts for me. Thoughts I've had for the past couple years of my life now. Not knowing my place in the world, what ethnicity I can claim without starting some whole debate and being that person who brings up statistics, like I just got my 23&Me results back. After the panel I walked. Walking around campus at night, looking at the stars, talking to the stars, and just laying on the ground looking and talking to the stars. I have very fond memories of my

grandparents at nighttime and outside with the stars so I felt comforted with them. I think that my grandparents can hear my voice when I talk to the stars. Last night was something for me. It was something I needed. I needed to hear it."

"The most important thing I got from the panel was an insight into how formalized education has repressed indigenous peoples and their ways of knowing. Before last night it was something I had heard of and about but couldn't see the ways it played out in my own classes. The point about strict control being the primary pillar of white supremacy and how that ties into our education system was also phenomenal. That was something that I had genuinely never thought of before, I guess because it is hard to look at a system you are already IN. I don't think I will ever be able to not notice again... I have not read braiding sweet grass but after that talk, I am going to. I am already on my own small journey to learn the woods a bit better and this book seems like a fantastic addition to that. I am glad I attended the panel, it was interesting and not something I would normally seek out for myself."
