Honor Society:

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National Art Honor Society - The National Art Honor Society was created for the purpose of inspiring and recognizing those students who have shown an outstanding ability in art. The RHHS Chapter of the National Art Honor Society is open to students in 10th, 11th and 12th grade who have taken 1.5 credits of art and earned a B+ or better. Membership is awarded to students who meet the criteria set by the NAEA. Membership is based on four areas: Art Scholarship, Leadership, Character, and Service to promote the Visual Arts. A yearly membership fee and requisite community service hours are required for induction. Seniors earn their honor cords for graduation by completing a senior project. Weekly planning and check in meetings are required of all members.

The faculty advisor and co captains manage the practices and attention is given to new students, especially freshmen and sophomores. Overall, the atmosphere is friendly as well as math-y and we are excited about having new members who share our interest in math.
