

Basics

1. What time does school start and end?

School begins at 9am and ends at 3:28pm. The school building opens at 8am for breakfast and closes at 6pm for students.

2. How many periods are in a day? How long are classes?

There are 8 periods in a day, including lunch. Each class is 45 minutes. There are some classes, like some science labs, that are double periods.

3. How many students are in a class?

The average class size is 22 students, for 9th grade it may be slightly higher.

4. Can students go out for lunch?

The 9th graders are to remain on the school grounds for the entire school day during their first semester.

5. How do students get to school?

FMJZ to Essex/Delancey Street and walk straight down Houston (about a mile)

M14D from 14th until Houston St/Mangin St (corner of the school).

There is no private transportation to BHSEC.

6. Is there a dress code?

No, but students are expected to dress appropriately.

7. How do grades interact with each other?

There are many opportunities for various grades to interact with each other: in classes, Writing and Thinking workshops, mentoring and tutoring programs, Big Sibs, clubs, and sports.

Academics

1. Will I have to repeat Algebra?

All incoming 9th graders are required to take the combined Algebra and Geometry course. This course is not a repeat of 8th grade Algebra.

2. What languages do you offer?

All 9th grade students will start with Introduction to Language and take Spanish, Latin, and Mandarin.

3. Can I take art?

Yes, you may choose to take art. However, in the 9th grade all students take the Introduction to Arts at BHSEC.

4. How many hours of homework is typical of a 9th grade student?

This is dependent on the teachers you have and your work ethic. But many current 9th graders say two to three hours.

5. How available are teachers to students who need extra help?

Teachers are available to students during office hours, which may either be walk-in or scheduled. Teachers are also available via email to schedule meeting and tutoring time.

Extracurriculars

1. Is there time to participate in extracurricular activities?

Yes, if you are good at managing your time.

2. What sports do you have?
