

Resources on Prison-Industrial Complex Abolition & Anti-Carceral Social Work

The purpose of this guide is to provide social work practitioners, researchers, and students with a robust list of resources to grow our field’s understanding of prison-industrial complex (PIC) abolition, and help move us closer to anti-carceral social change work. You’ll notice that many of the pieces listed are not academic in nature, and this was a deliberate choice. Researchers are trained to view non-academic sources as less worthy of attention and citation. This list rebukes that position, and brings the work of system-involved/impacted people, organizers, journalists, and others outside of the academy to the forefront, while also including the work of abolitionist scholars.

The intention behind curating these resources is to encourage their incorporation into existing social work syllabi, to promote the creation of entirely new course offerings, and to support organized reading groups focused on learning more about PIC abolition, and its alignment with social work values and ethics.

This is by no means an exhaustive list. This resource will be a living document that I hope abolitionist social workers will continue to build on together. 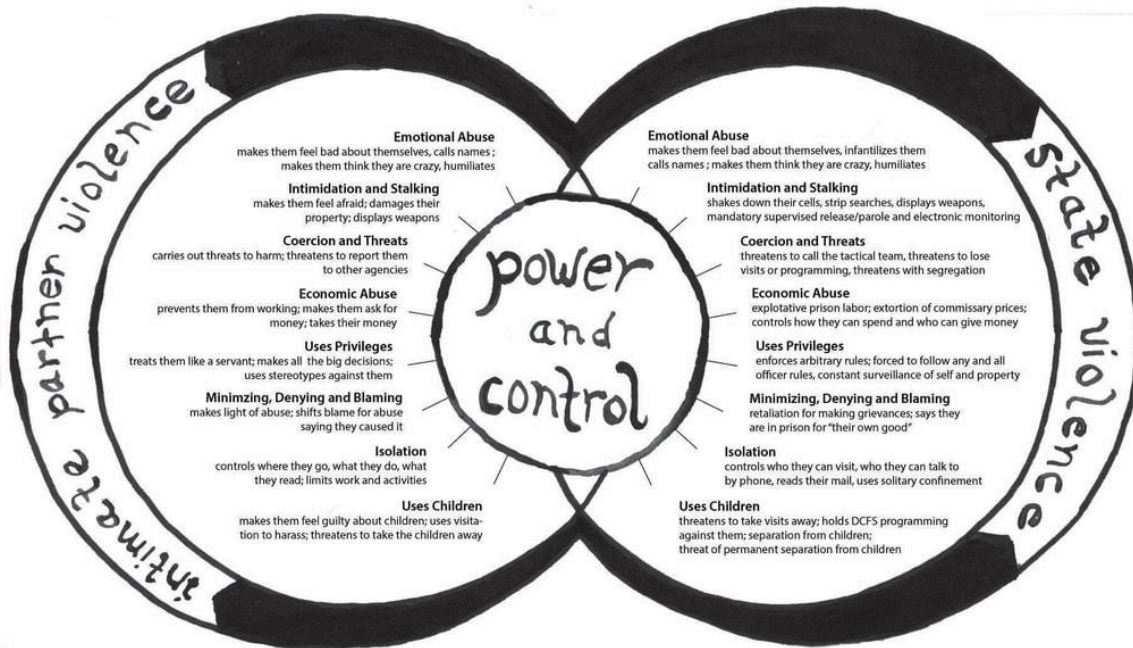
