Tobacco Sale Restrictions (Smokefree Generations) Bill 2023

Explanatory Memorandum/statement of compatibility with human rights

Outline

A Bill for an Act to create smokefree generations, and for related purposes

- All people born on or after January 1, 2009, will be permanently disallowed from purchasing tobacco products, or being given tobacco products in public.
- This law makes it an offence for a person to sell a tobacco product to a person born on or after the above date.
- This law makes it an offence for a person to, after having sold tobacco product to a person of any age, deliver that product to a person born on or after the above date.
- This law makes it an offence to supply a person born after the above date with a tobacco product in a public place. It also makes it an offence to supply a tobacco product to a person with the intention that it will then be supplied (directly or indirectly) to a person born after the above date.
- This law does not make it an offence to supply a tobacco product to a person born after the above date in a private setting.
- This will create generations of Australians known as the 'smokefree generations' who are not allowed to purchase tobacco products, and will subsequently raise the general physical health of these generations.

Date of effect: The day after this Bill receives Presidential Assent. In practice, this Bill will have a noticeable impact from January 1, 2027, which is when those born on January 1, 2009 otherwise would have been able to legally purchase tobacco products.

Financial Impact: The proposed Bill will have no financial impact until January 1, 2027, from which tobacco excises may reduce.

Human rights implication: This bill does not raise any human rights issues.
