Be realistic about your goal. Explain clearly how this case study relates to open GLAM in the Global South and/or underrepresented communities and/or low-capacity, non-Western institutions.]

#### 6. Case Evaluation

[This is the core of the case study. Highlight the essential aspects of your case. Are these aspects positive, negative or neutral? What influence do they have on your subject? Some objective observations and a subjective analysis can nicely complement each other.]

#### 7. Proposed Solutions

[What are some realistic solutions to solve the problems? How could you mitigate negative impacts? Describe your proposed solutions and share concrete data and evidence.]

#### 8. Conclusion

[Summarize the key takeaways from the case evaluation and proposed solution(s). Outline your successes. Show the impact. Be succinct.]

## 9. Recommendations

[Talk about the strategy to overcome the challenge and explain why it is the most appropriate.]

## 10. Implementation

[Explain how to put the recommendation into action.]

[Provide all the citations and links to sources, reference documents and any further readings.]
