This summer we are asking you to practice your reading skills by reading the book *Ungifted* by author, Gordon Korman.

We hope you will enjoy reading this funny novel. We have found that reading is a fun activity which allows us to use our minds to explore far-away lands and travel anywhere we can imagine. We can also find friends with whom we can relate. In addition, reading can help us attain new information and hone our thinking skills. Do you think while you read? The best way to be a great reader is to practice. As great readers, we all think about the plot, characters, setting, vocabulary, and conflict. We ask ourselves questions. We make inferences. We draw conclusions. We make predictions based on what we have read. Annotating text is a useful tool to help you begin thinking about the text you read. Annotating uses simple symbols to represent our thoughts as we read.

Ungifted is yours to keep, so you may write directly in your book. If you run out of space, you can always add a *post-it note* for extra writing space anywhere you need it. We have attached some sample annotation marks that you should use when you read *Ungifted*. You may have other thoughts you want to annotate as you read and that's great. This chart is simply a place for you to start.

As you read, use the annotation marks (see next page) appropriately in the text. You may need to read a chapter more than once in order to practice using the annotation marks along with adding your own thoughts. You are required to have at least two annotations per chapter. The annotations you make will be used as "discussion starters" as we begin our learning together in August. Please bring your annotated book with you on the first day of school. There will be an assessment and/or activities to follow your summer reading during the first weeks of school.

We hope you enjoy the story and your summer. We look forward to meeting you. Have a wonderful summer break!
