The abstract must be written in English (Raleway, Italic, 10).</i> <i>Keywords should consist of a minimum of three and a maximum of four terms. They do not have to be taken from the title; instead, they are ideally selected from the main terms that are most frequently discussed throughout the manuscript as a whole. 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INTRODUCTION (Raleway, Bold, 12)

The introduction serves as a preliminary section of the manuscript before entering the description of the discussion or research content. Manuscripts submitted to the ZICONS Journal are formatted in Candara (12 pt), single-spaced, with each paragraph consisting of approximately 10–14 lines. The ZICONS Journal adopts an introduction structure that begins with a general paragraph, followed by a specific paragraph, a discussion of the ideal condition versus the existing reality that gives rise to the main research problem, the research objectives, and the research contribution. (Candara 12, spasi 1, non-add space)

The introduction should be approximately one full page at minimum and three pages at maximum. The citation system uses the body note format following APA Style, 7th edition (e.g., Nurdin & Ridwansyah, 2020). Reference citation is expected to be managed using applications such as Mendeley or Zotero. (Candara 12, spasi 1, non-add space)

LITERATURE REVIEW (Raleway, Bold, 12)

The literature review is a section of the journal article that describes the position of the current research in relation to previous writings or publications. Therefore, the literature review is expected to serve as a unique distinguishing element, commonly referred to as research novelty. The literature review in the **ZICONS Journal** consists of **five paragraphs**, with each paragraph comprising **10–14 lines**.

Paragraph 1: The literature review pattern of the ZICONS Journal is as follows: studies related to the theme or title are not entirely new, as several researchers have previously examined and published works on the topic using various methods and approaches. The first author, in a work entitled (*Title of Work 1*), discusses ... (narrate the general outline of Work 1), its findings, the similarities between Work (1) and the author's study, and the differences between Work (1) and the author's study. (Candara 12, spasi 1, non-add space)

Paragraph 2: The second author, in a work entitled (*Title of Work 2*), discusses ... (narrate the general outline of Work 2), its findings, the similarities between Work (2) and the author's study, and the differences between Work (2) and the author's study. **Paragraph 3:** The third author, in a work entitled (*Title of Work 3*), discusses ... (narrate the general outline of Work 3), its findings, the similarities between Work (3) and the author's study, and the differences between Work (3) and the author's study. **Paragraph 4:** This paragraph narrates the research gap of the present study in relation to previous works (novelty). For example: "*Studies on the moderation of sharia have been widely discussed by*

previous scholars. However, sharia moderation viewed from the perspective of ancient manuscripts such as *Hadih Madja* of Aceh has not yet been explored, even though many substantive elements within *Hadih Madja* teach values of moderation and *mu'āmalah*. The novelty of this study lies in emphasizing how *Hadih Madja* remains relevant to sharia moderation, despite its historical existence during the Aceh Sultanate period.” (Candara 12, spasi 1, non-add space)

METHOD (Raleway, Bold, 12)

The methodology section in the **ZICONS Journal** consists of **2–4 paragraphs**, with each paragraph containing **10–14 lines**. The methodology follows this structure: (a) a statement identifying the article as a type of research (library-based or field-based) with a qualitative or quantitative approach; (b) the methodology employed; (c) primary and secondary data sources; (d) data validation methods, data credibility testing, and data analysis techniques; and (e) the mechanism for drafting the manuscript from sources into a journal article. (Candara 12, spasi 1, non-add space)

RESULTS & DISCUSSION (Raleway, Bold, 12)

Subheading 1 (Candara 12)

The discussion section in the **Putroe Phang Journal** must consist of a minimum of **three (3) subheadings** and a maximum of **seven (7) subheadings**. Each subheading should contain **at least five paragraphs**, with each paragraph consisting of approximately **10–14 lines**. However, if the manuscript requires this section, the subheading should not be overly brief in its content and should consist of at least three paragraphs or more. Each paragraph should contain approximately 10–14 lines. (Candara 12, spasi 1, non-add space)

Figure or Table Format

This section is not mandatory; however, if included, the image source must be clearly cited. For tables, the title should be placed **below the table** and written in *italics*. Writing of Qur'anic Verses or Hadiths (if any)

The typing of Qur'anic verses or hadiths must not be in image form (JPG/PNG), but in Word text using the **“Traditional Arabic”** font, size **16**, with **single spacing**. It is recommended that the Arabic versions of verses or hadiths not be too numerous, as this may affect the similarity index of the manuscript. The translation or interpretation of the verse should be written in **one paragraph**, with **all lines in italics**, without explicitly using the terms “translation” or “meaning.” References for verses should not merely mention the name of the surah, but also specify **which Qur'an edition or translation** is used. References should be directed **only to the translated text**, not to the Arabic text itself. The following is an example: (Candara 12, spasi 1, non-add space)

CONCLUSION (Raleway, bold, 12)

In this section, the author presents a concise conclusion drawn from the research findings, along with suggestions for future researchers or general readers. The conclusion may review the main points of the paper but should not replicate the abstract as a conclusion. The author should not merely list the main weaknesses and limitations of the study, as doing so may reduce the validity of the work and raise questions from readers regarding whether, or how, the limitations may have influenced the results and conclusions. Limitations require critical assessment and interpretation of their impact. The author must address the question of whether the issues relate to errors, methodology, validity, or other factors. Generally, the conclusion consists of **only two paragraphs**, with each paragraph comprising approximately **10–14 lines**. (Candara 12, spasi 1, non-add space)

REFERENCES (Raleway, bold, 12)

Citations should be managed using applications such as Mendeley or Zotero and follow APA Style, 7th edition. References should be written with complete elements. For journal articles, mandatory components include the author’s name, year of publication, article title, publisher/journal name, volume, issue number, page range, and DOI. The formatting of references should use Capitalize Each Word (initial capital letters for each main word), not ALL CAPITAL LETTERS. At least 75% of the references should come from scholarly journal articles published within the last three years. Exceptions are acceptable for seminal or primary books, such as classical texts, for which no newer editions are available. References are also expected to cite a minimum of three international (Scopus-indexed) sources. The following is an example of reference citation in the reference list:

Additional Provisions

1. Write the draft using this template without altering the existing template settings (header and footer).
2. The manuscript must contain a minimum of 5,000 words and a maximum of 8,000 words.
3. The overall font used in the manuscript is Candara, 12 pt (except for the main title).
4. The writing flow is recommended to follow an inductive structure (from general to specific).
5. The minimum acceptable manuscript must not exceed 30% plagiarism similarity. The journal will use Turnitin with the “accurate” setting (non-word, exclude bibliography, non-exclude quotes).
6. If the author is from Indonesia, the original manuscript (Indonesian version) must be attached for similarity checking purposes.
