

# Running for Town Supervisor

## A Candidate Information Guide for Delaware County, New York

Are you considering serving your community as Town Supervisor? This guide will walk you through what the role involves, what qualifications are required, and the steps to get your name on the ballot in Delaware County, New York.

### The Role of Town Supervisor

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The Town Supervisor is the chief executive officer and chief fiscal officer of the town, as well as a member and presiding officer of the Town Board. This is a critical local government position with broad responsibilities.

#### Executive & Administrative Duties

- Serves as the chief executive officer (CEO) of the town
- Presides over all Town Board meetings and votes on matters before the Board
- Oversees the daily administration and operations of town government
- Supervises town employees and department heads
- Enforces town laws, ordinances, and resolutions
- Represents the town in intergovernmental affairs and with the public

#### Financial Responsibilities

- Serves as the chief fiscal officer of the town
- Prepares and presents the annual town budget to the Town Board
- Oversees the management of town funds and accounts
- Signs checks and authorizes expenditures on behalf of the town
- Submits annual financial reports to the New York State Comptroller
- Ensures proper financial controls and accountability

#### Legislative Role

- Votes on local laws, resolutions, and town policies as a Town Board member
- Introduces legislation and policy proposals
- Works with the Town Board to adopt and amend local ordinances

#### Additional Responsibilities

- Signs contracts and legal documents on behalf of the town
- Issues building permits and other approvals (in some towns, depending on local law)
- Coordinates emergency management and disaster response
- Appoints members to town committees and boards (subject to Board approval)
- Serves as a liaison with Delaware County government and state agencies

## At a Glance: Key Facts

<b>Term Length</b>	4 years (elected in odd-numbered years, takes office January 1)
<b>Compensation</b>	Varies by town; set by the Town Board (see your town's local laws)
<b>Governing Body</b>	Town Board (Supervisor + 2 or 4 Councilpersons, depending on town population)
<b>State Authority</b>	New York State Town Law governs the powers and duties of Town Supervisors

## Eligibility Requirements

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To run for Town Supervisor in New York State, candidates must meet the following requirements under state law:

- **Residency:** Be a registered voter in the town where you seek election
- **Age:** Be at least 18 years of age
- **Residency Duration:** Have been a resident of the town for at least 30 days prior to the election
- **Legal Status:** Not be currently under any legal disability that would bar you from holding public office

*Note: Some towns may have additional requirements set by local law. Contact your Town Clerk or the Delaware County Board of Elections to confirm requirements specific to your town.*

## Steps to Run for Town Supervisor

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Running for office involves several key steps. Here is a general roadmap for candidates in Delaware County, New York:

1. **Step 1: Confirm Your Eligibility** Determine your eligibility and review your town's local laws to confirm any additional requirements.
2. **Step 2: Contact the Board of Elections & Your Town Clerk** Contact the Delaware County Board of Elections (607-832-5321) and your Town Clerk early in the process. They can provide critical guidance, deadlines, and the correct petition forms.
3. **Step 3: Decide on Party Affiliation or Independent Run** Most candidates run on a party line (Democratic, Republican, etc.) or as an independent. To run on a party line, you will typically need to be designated at a party caucus or convention. Contact your local party committee for their process.
4. **Step 4: Gather Petition Signatures** To get on the ballot, you must collect a required number of valid signatures from registered voters in your town on a nominating petition. The number of signatures required depends on the number of enrolled voters in the town. Petitions must use official forms available from the Board of Elections.
5. **Step 5: File Your Nominating Petition** Completed petitions must be filed with the Delaware County Board of Elections by the statutory deadline. For general elections (November), petitions are typically due in late July or early August. Verify the exact date each year with the Board of Elections.
6. **Step 6: Complete Required Filings** Upon filing, you will need to file a Candidate Authorization form if nominated by a party. You may also need to designate a petition representative for any challenges.

7. **Step 7: Campaign Finance Compliance** If you raise or spend more than \$1,000 (or in some cases any amount), you are required to file campaign finance disclosure reports with the New York State Board of Elections. Open a dedicated campaign bank account and keep detailed records.
8. **Step 8: Campaign!** Campaign in your community! Attend town events, knock on doors, send mailers, and use social media to share your vision for the town. Engage with local media and community organizations.
9. **Step 9: Election Day** The general election for Town Supervisor is held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November in odd-numbered years (e.g., 2025, 2027).
10. **Step 10: If Elected — Transition & Training** If elected, you will take office on January 1 following the election. Plan to attend orientations and training sessions offered by the New York State Association of Towns.

# 2026 Key Dates for Town Supervisor Candidates

## EARLY STEPS — PARTY PRIMARY ROUTE (June 23, 2026 Primary)

<b>Feb 24</b>	First day to hold a town caucus • First day to circulate Designating Petitions (party route)
<b>Mar 30</b>	First day to FILE Designating Petitions at Delaware County Board of Elections
<b>Apr 2</b>	Last day to CIRCULATE Designating Petitions
<b>Apr 6</b>	DEADLINE: Last day to FILE Designating Petitions (9 am–5 pm)
<b>Apr 10</b>	Last day to authorize designation • Last day to accept or decline a designation
<b>Apr 14</b>	Last day to fill a vacancy caused by a declination of designation

**!** Signature requirements vary by town size — confirm the exact number with the Delaware County Board of Elections before circulating.

<b>~May 22</b>	Campaign Finance: Pre-Primary report due (32 days before the June 23 Primary — if raising/spending over \$1,000)
<b>Jun 13</b>	Voter registration & absentee application deadline for Primary Election

## GENERAL ELECTION ROUTE — Independent & Party Nominees (November 3, 2026)

<b>Apr 14</b>	First day to circulate Independent Nominating Petitions for the General Election
<b>May 19</b>	First day to FILE Independent Nominating Petitions at Delaware County Board of Elections
<b>May 26</b>	DEADLINE: Last day to circulate AND file Independent Nominating Petitions
<b>May 29</b>	Last day to accept or decline an independent nomination
<b>Jun 2</b>	Last day to fill a vacancy caused by a declination of nomination
<b>Apr 14</b>	First day to circulate Independent Nominating Petitions for the General Election

## CAMPAIGN FINANCE REPORTING (NYS Board of Elections)

**!** Most Delaware County towns have fewer than 10,000 residents. If you raise or spend \$1,000 or less total, you may file a Claim of Exemption (CF-05) instead of full reports. If you exceed \$1,000 at any point, you must register and file all applicable reports.

<b>ASAP</b>	Register your campaign committee at elections.ny.gov • Open a dedicated campaign bank account
<b>~Oct 2</b>	Pre-General Election report due (32 days before Election Day — November 3)
<b>Oct 4–Nov 3</b>	24-hour notice required for any single contribution or loan over \$1,000
<b>~Nov 30</b>	Post-General Election report due (27 days after Election Day)

## FINAL STRETCH — General Election

<b>Oct 19</b>	Change of Address deadline for General Election — address change must be received by Board of Elections
<b>Oct 24</b>	Voter registration deadline for General Election • Last day to apply by mail or online for absentee ballot
<b>Oct 24–Nov 1</b>	Early Voting period for General Election
<b>Nov 2</b>	Last day to apply in person for a General Election absentee ballot
<b>Nov 3</b>	★ GENERAL ELECTION DAY — Polls open 6 am to 9 pm

## Delaware County Board of Elections petition data for 2025

Just to give you an idea of approximately how many signatures you'll need to get on the ballot, here's a breakdown of the required signatures for **town supervisor** by town, organized by party (the "Sigs" column reflects the minimum required signatures for each party's designating petition).

The signature requirement is based on 5% of enrolled party voters in the town (not the specific office). Ask the Delaware County Board of Elections for the exact number you need.

A few notes:

- These figures are from the **2025 election cycle** as reported by the Delaware County Board of Elections.
- The higher signature counts listed under independent/third-party labels (e.g., "COM," "SID," "MER") are for independent nominating petitions, which require more signatures than major party designating petitions.
- The number of required signatures is set at **5% of enrolled party voters** in the town under New York State Election Law §6-136, which is why the numbers vary significantly by town size.
- Not every town had candidates from both major parties file in 2025 — some towns appear to only have had one party active.
