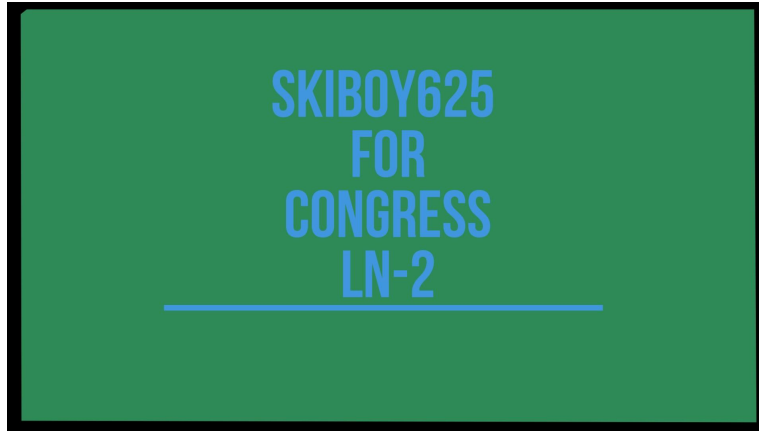


*After announcing a canvassing kickoff event in downtown Milwaukee, skiboy625 arrives to hundreds of supporters who are preparing or are ready to knock on doors across Milwaukee and its suburbs.*

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New signs which were unveiled in a recent email are finally seen in person dotting the park. Many supporters also carry their own after picking them up at a registration table.

Firstly I want to thank you all profusely for taking the time to be here today. I know many of you have busy lives, but taking the time to come here and sign up to canvas really means a lot to me. Campaigning, while I am very passionate about takes a lot of time to do, much of this time which I don't have. Since I can't be everywhere at once, having a large dedicated group to help advocate for our cause is essential, and today it will pay off!

*Many in the crowd applaud, again with many people waving signs.*

So, before you all go off, I just want to go over some important stuff that all of you should know. Firstly I want to go over some basics for you all about the fine art of... canvassing.

The most important part of canvassing is obviously to get our message known. By telling people about the campaign, by getting contact information, and by being polite and respectful. Remember, you are going to people's homes and you are knocking on their doors, so be respectful and mindful of people's lives. If someone refuses then leave them be, if someone isn't interested then thank them and move on, and if someone isn't home then move to the next house. However, you obviously and hopefully will have people to talk to. So in that case does anyone know what the most important thing to do is?

Correct! Being respectful is incredibly important to help bring us support and to prevent a bad experience while canvassing. When someone comes to the door, always be nice and introduce yourself before saying who you are there to support. Always try to see if there is any interest from the person, which sometimes there isn't. However, if a person asks then advocate for what our agenda is. Obviously you can talk about repairing the nation's crippled infrastructure, enacting environmental protections, and reforming our education system. Try to keep things on the concise side as we have to conserve our time at the same time as respecting other people's time. If the person is interested also, make sure to get some contact information! Every person we can inform about our campaign is another potential vote towards protecting the futures of Americans everywhere.

In addition to what we should do, there are several things which we shouldn't do out of respect for people and their property. We make sure we don't enter people's homes even if offered, we don't touch anyone's mailbox, and we don't leave behind any signs in the streets. If people wish to have a sign, then by all means they can use a sign; but to help leave as little of an impact on the environment, we need to make sure we keep stuff clean. There's no point in advocating for change if you're going to ignore your own beliefs, am I right?

*The crowd says "yes."*

That's great to hear. So again to everyone as I have said, thank you all for taking the time to volunteer today. With such a limited amount of time, it is paramount that we get people to listen and learn of our message and commitment to the residents of the 2nd Congressional

District. I am super excited that this many people came out, and I'm hopeful we can really make a lot of progress in the streets of Milwaukee today!

*The crowd cheers enthusiastically, as a chant of "ski for you and ski for me" breaks out.*

So now that we are all excited and prepared, let's get canvassing! If you've looked around, you may have seen some of my wonderful aides around you all here. Once you're all ready to go, find a group where you'll be assigned a neighborhood to knock doors in. From South Milwaukee and Greendale, north to Butler and Whitefish Bay, let's get out there and bring some change to Milwaukee!

*The crowd again cheers with growing excitement. Many people disperse to join into separate groups. After going around and thanking groups individually, skiboy watches as the groups branch out to canvass. While some group into cars, many take city buses out to neighborhoods to keep true to their word on limiting their environmental impact as much as possible.*
