Finding a community and support for veterans, Bermudez was able to enter the accelerated 4+1 program, allowing her to earn her bachelor's and master's degrees in a shorter timeline. This May she's set to graduate with her <u>master's degree in psychology</u> and will be the student speaker at the <u>Veterans Stole Ceremony</u>. Today Bermudez works as the self-directed harm prevention specialist in the integrated primary prevention workforce for the National Guard.
- Holly Molinaro This ASU graduate made <u>national headlines</u> with her research showing that pet owners may not know their dogs as well as they think. Under the mentorship of <u>Professor Clive Wynne</u> in ASU's <u>Canine Science Collaboratory</u>, Molinaro has spent her doctoral career exploring how dogs express emotion and how successful people are at identifying those emotions. With strong family support, she has thrived both academically and socially, challenging stereotypes about gifted youth. Her professors praise her maturity, emotional intelligence and self-driven passion for learning. Despite her age,

she has navigated the college environment and hopes to study human rights law, using her education to advocate for marginalized communities and eventually open a nonprofit to offer free legal services.

- Omkaar Shenoy Shenoy is an international student worker for ASU's Office of Media
 Relations and Strategic Communications, where his innovations helped streamline internal
 systems with his programming and coding skills. He is graduating from the <u>Ira A. Fulton Schools
 of Engineering</u> with a bachelor's degree in computer science and has a job lined up at Aramark in
 Philadelphia post-graduation. His engineering talents have left an impact that will continue to
 make ASU more efficient for years to come.

An advocate for women in STEM and a mentor to younger generations, she has led multiple student organizations, notably serving two years as president of Advancing Women in Construction.
