#### Goal

- Students will become more comfortable with the technical and musical aspects of "An American in Paris"
- Students will analyze the different sections of "An American in Paris" and play the sections according to their analyzation
- Students will understand modes and their importance

# Assessment of Goal

- Audio assessment of modes and rhythms in warm up
- Audio assessment of sections of the piece
- Verbal assessment of the differences in the sections of the piece and how to portray that on each instrument

# Lesson Plan

# Warm-up

- 1. Students will play an A flat Major scale using sixteenth note/ eighth note rhythms on the board
- 2. Students will play the same scale starting on the second and third notes on the scale.
  - a. What are these different scales called? (Modes)
- 3. Write a C Major scale on the board and explain the modes and how they function in a scale
- 4. Play an A flat scale with the forth sharped
  - a. Which mode is this? (Lydian)
- 5. Tune

#### Lesson

- 1. Take out "An American in Paris"
- 2. Listen to original orchestra transcription
  - a. Why did Gershwin write this piece of music?
    - To portray his trip to Paris
    - What is Gershwin trying to portray by the instruments in the beginning section (Trumpets as horns, etc.)
- 3. Play beginning section without melody
- 4. Work on the timing of 3rd clarinet, tuba, alto saxophone parts
  - a. These parts are the foundation of the section
- 5. LIsten to the melody
  - a. Talk about the placement of the grace note
- 6. Start at m. 117 in "An American in Paris" (no solo)
  - a. Listen for off/ on beats
  - b. Analyze the dynamic markings
    - Why are there so many crescendos/ decrescendos?
- 7. Work on the transitions between these two sections
  - a. How are they different? What is Gershwin going for?
- 8. Relate Bass trombone solo and Bass Clarinet solo at 70
- Add in solo at 117
  - a. How should this solo be played? What is the feel?
- 10. Address rhythmic accuracy of the flute line at 124 (with snare)
- 11. Play from beginning until m. 150
