

Competency in Advanced Writing (CADW) Rubric Draft for Faculty Review/Testing, Spring 2023

Purpose

The purpose of this rubric is to:

1. Help students understand the expectations related to how they demonstrate the Competency in Advanced Writing (CADW) learning outcomes;
2. Help faculty construct assignment prompts that align with the CADW learning outcomes;
3. Help faculty to evaluate samples of student works that demonstrate student learning in CADW-designated courses.

Students will complete writing requirements within a Core or major/minor course. Courses are writing intensive and writing instructive, focusing on teaching writing as a process. This includes pre-writing, multiple drafts, feedback, revision, and editing.

Advanced Writing builds on first-year writing (FYW), providing further instruction in the same four basic outcome areas. Most students will work more specifically within an academic discipline, equipping them to succeed in their majors.

Competency in Advanced Writing Rubric Framing Language

1. It is recommended that faculty teaching a CADW-flagged course include a supplement to this rubric that contains expectations for what constitutes professional and/or scholarly writing in their area of study, including: discourse conventions; scholarly frameworks; source citation conventions; writing formats; genre conventions; use of sources and/or evidence.
2. The focus of Advanced Writing is on the *process* of writing. This rubric can be particularly useful for students when working on multiple drafts of a given work because students can get specific feedback on early drafts regarding the level of their performance for the learning outcomes associated with that assignment, and see what they need to do to move to higher levels on the rubric as they work on later drafts.
3. The target is that all students ultimately demonstrate proficiency (Level 3) in all CADW learning outcomes.
