

A Title is Fewest Possible Words, Accurately Describe the Content

(Title should be Clearly Defined and Informative (max 14 words); using Times New Roman (TNR) size-14 pt, single spacing, bold, align center)

(Authors' names without academic title, TNR size-12 pt, single spacing, align center)

ABSTRACT (use EBSJ – Abstract Heading)

(Write the abstract in English. The Abstract should be informative and completely self-explanatory, provide a clear statement of the problem, explain the reason why this study is important to do, novelty, explain the research method used, the proposed approach, point out major findings and conclusions. The Abstract should be 150 to 300 words in length and in italicized format. The abstract should be written in the past tense. Standard nomenclature should be used and abbreviations should be avoided. No literature should be cited, use TNR 11 pt, single space, and the word "Abstract" is indented. Beside that, the keyword list provides the opportunity to add keywords, used by the indexing and abstracting services, in addition to those already present in the title. Judicious use of keywords may increase the ease with which interested parties can locate our article).

INTRODUCTION (use EBSJ – Subtitle)

We ask that authors follow some simple guidelines. In essence, we ask you to make your paper look exactly like this document. The easiest way to do this is simply to download the template and replace the content with your own material. Introduce to your reader the "problem" by providing a brief background of your research. Include the basic reasons how and why you came-up with the problem, and the probable solutions that you can offer. In general, the introduction summarizes the purpose of the research paper. (use EBSJ – Content)

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THEORETICAL BACKGROUND (use EBSJ – Subtitle)

This section is where you will be providing all the relevant readings from previous works. Provide brief summaries or descriptions of the works of other authors. Make sure

that your research materials are from credible sources such as academic books and peer-reviewed journals. Also, make sure that your reading materials are directly relevant to the topic of your research paper. The literature review typically includes the names of the authors, the titles of their works and the year of the publication of these works. (use EBSJ – Content)

Explanation of sub-section heading is written in paragraph form. It is recommended not to use too many bullet points that have explanations. (Use styles: EBSJ - Content)

METHOD, DATA AND ANALYSIS (use EBSJ – Subtitle)

It should be written clearly and completely containing a clear description of analytical, and/or statistical procedures; so they can be repeated by other researchers. References of original methods/procedures must be stated and all modifications of procedures (if any) should be explained. Methods comprises brief information concerning research paradigm to be applied, approach(es), procedure(s), and type/characteristic (please select one of them) as the leading format for your research. Mention unit of analysis with comprehensive data analysis. (use EBSJ – Content)

RESULTS (use EBSJ – Subtitle)

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This part presents results or findings. Figures or graphs can also be presented here to support your findings, and there should be no duplication of data in graphs or figures. We suggest that you mention supporting instrument(s), in forms of illustration, figures, photographs, tables, and graphs. Each instrument must be orderly numbered and given a title, followed by source from which you make the citation. Should the instrument is the result from the author's analysis, please write: 'source: author's analysis.' (use EBSJ – Content)

DISCUSSION (use EBSJ – Subtitle)

This part contains analysis of the findings and reflection/discussion according to the research findings. In presenting the discussion, use a comprehensive explanation in order to elaborate the whole data found during the research. Review the information in the introduction part, evaluate their gained results, and compare it with past studies. By doing so, you can fill gap of knowledge. Furthermore, in the discussion section should be logically lead to the conclusion: are the results presented related to original question, make sure there is no repetition of results in discussion section, limitation and weakness of the study need to be explained. (use EBSJ – Content)

CONCLUSIONS (use EBSJ – Subtitle)

Conclusion should be written briefly in single paragraph. This part presents recommendation as well as implication of the finding as a whole, either intended to broaden method realm or to develop a theoretical framework, as such that it outreaches the users from broader societies. Moreover, it can also be added the prospect of further studies into the next (based on results and discussion). (use EBSJ – Content)

REFERENCES (use EBSJ – References)

(write the references in alphabetical order).

■ Citation within the text uses a bodynote.

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- Citing a citation, using ‘Anonym’ as reference are not allowed.
- Minimum number of the priority references is 15 (references published last 7 years, 100% from international journals).

The secondary data (textbooks/e-books, national journals, scientific works (thesis or dissertation) and/or internet) does not include the 10 priority references. The secondary data (references also published last 7 years) must not exceed 10 per cent of the total references.

- References writing and Citation must use reference management software (Mendeley) **with APA Styles (Sixth or Seventh Edition)**.

- Make sure the metadata you entered into the Mendeley database is correct, so when you call the metadata, the reference data that appears in the paper is also right.

- Updated references (references published last 7 years) contribute to more than 90% of your paper acceptance.

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Please be sure to check for spelling and grammar before submitting your paper. Try to comply with the template; we are using A4 borderless paper. Please maintain the format and do not change or revise the specifications in this layout.

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appropriate division and subdivision gradually. Besides, consider the writing language standard as follows;

1. **Figure (number)** (use EBSJ – Sub-section Heading)

For figures less than ten, please write them in letter (eg: one, two, ... instead of 1, 2, ...). Use the English standard for decimal and unit (1.2 is one comma two, and 1,000 is thousand).

2. **Abbreviations and Acronyms** (use EBSJ – Sub-section Heading)

Please do not use any abbreviation in the title while probable. It needs that the abbreviated word should be defined at first time used in the manuscript.

3. **Units** (use EBSJ – Sub-section Heading)

- Please use SI unit standard and do not mix with other standard.
- Use a zero before decimal points: “0.25”, not “.25”. Use “cm³”, not “cc”. (bullet list)

4. **Equations** (use EBSJ – Sub-section Heading)

Equations should be numbered consecutively and can use either the same font (times new roman) or the formula font.

Define the equation and its attributes. To refer with the equation, use “(1)” in the middle of the sentence and “Equation (1)...” while the sentence begins with.

5. **Be notified of the followings:** (use EBSJ – Sub-section Heading)

- Plural Greek word: “phenomena”, “data”
- Zero is “0” not the lower case “o” for indexed word, as in t₀.
- Use the word “associate” or “relate” instead of “impact” or “affect” while the research does not conduct any experiment.
- Mind the word writing and the homophones: as “allowed vs aloud”, “principle vs principal”, “affect vs effect”

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Check if all the typing errors and any other mistakes (figure, reference, table, source...) are improved, then, if the text is ready; copy them gradually using this template.

1. **Title** (use EBSJ – Sub-section Heading)

Put the title in capital letter. If possible, do not use any abbreviation.

2. **Authors and Affiliations** (use EBSJ – Sub-section Heading)

Write down the full name without any abbreviation. Underneath each name, write the affiliation and e-mail address. The first name consists of the main author and main affiliation.

3. **Figures and Tables** (use EBSJ – Sub-section Heading)

Figures and tables are not included in the column. Please place them in the middle of the paper especially when the size is large enough. Do not use any border in the middle of the table. Each figures and table are numbered (with link) and underneath, the source should be mentioned.

For table, the title should be above the table, whereas the explanation and source should be underneath.

Use the symbol ***, ** and * for significance level $\alpha=0.01$, $\alpha=0.05$ and $\alpha=0.1$. As for Figure, the title and the source should be both underneath.

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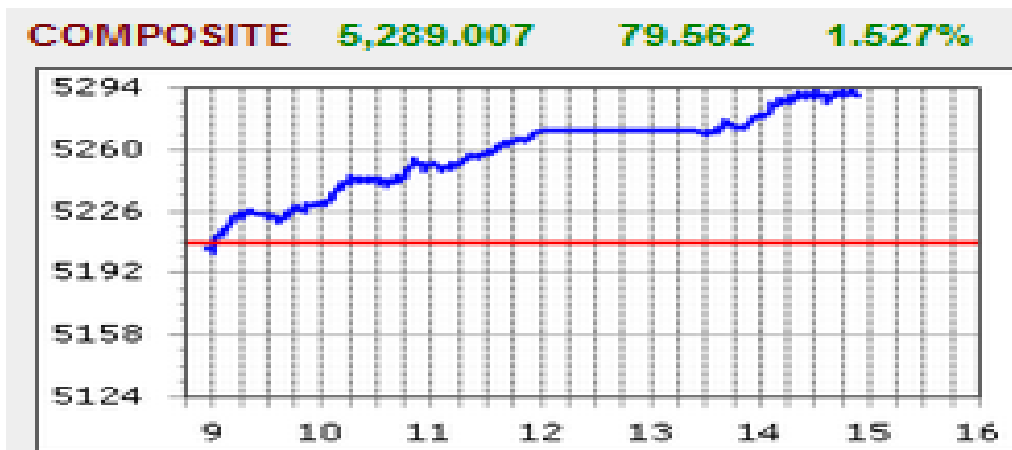
