

Open Letter to the People and Assembly of Sierra

My fellow Sierrans,

I intend to keep this as brief as possible.

Over the course of my career in this wonderful state, I've had the pleasure of serving alongside some of the most dedicated civil servants a citizen could ask for. Having lived most of my life in the suburbs of Southern California, and being the son of a small business owner, I've been fully aware of the issues that face the middle class.

The desire to face those issues head-on, to solve them and ensure that the middle class had a secure future was what inspired my entry into politics. But along the way, my scope of the issues facing the people widened. I gained a greater understanding of the problems facing all people of all classes.

Whether you are making less than \$20,000 or more than \$1,000,000 annually, or some number in between, you are being overtaxed and overburdened by government overregulation. In California especially, an overabundance of laws has created flaming hoops that citizens must jump through if they want to merely **start** their own business.

The government should be **clearing** the path to the American Dream, not setting up a near impossible obstacle course. Nor should the government be providing services that can be better provided by private industry and the free market. Instead, I respectfully declined the offer to be a congressman, because the best position for me is the one I earn. Maybe then I will consider a position in congress.

Until that day comes, I will be loyal and committed to the people of this state. I genuinely hope that all who hear these words will know them to be true. Because I, Speaker of the Assembly Atlas_Black, am officially putting in my bid to run for Governor of the great State of Sierra. Should I be elected, I will continue to serve to the best of my ability. I will continue to work alongside every member of the assembly, regardless of whether they are on the right, the left, or in the middle.
