**Development of the learning outcomes is promoted through the following teaching and learning methods:**

Our strategy is to offer a variety of appropriate and contemporary teaching methods and learning opportunities relevant to the learning outcomes. Learning outcomes have been identified for all modules which are distributed to staff and students. Feedback is provided to students throughout the programme and in a variety of ways. This enables students to gain more self-knowledge.

Our teaching programme is integrated so that students acquire an understanding of the basic scientific and pathological processes underlying oral and dental disease at the same time as they learn the skills to manage patients appropriately and maintain and promote health.

**Lectures, tutorials and seminars**

Lectures are used to convey essential information. Tutorials and seminars explore material through discussion and aid the application of theoretical knowledge to the clinical setting and are used to facilitate exchange of ideas through discussion. Lectures, tutorials and seminars also contribute to the development of appropriate attitudes. (K1-5, S2,3,5,6).

**Practical classes**

Focus on the development of practical skills but also encourage knowledge and understanding outcomes. This may include preparation and practical work. (K1-5, S1-4,6).

**Project supervision**

Focus on knowledge and understanding of a particular area in detail but also develop transferrable skills. One-to-one supervision is used to support the planning and implementation of an Oral Health Promotion project. (K1-5, S1-7).

**Teamwork**

A number of modules have a teamwork focus where teaching is delivered alongside the dental students. Students sometimes work in pairs or small groups, generating an awareness of the importance and benefits of teamwork and enabling students to learn from one another. (K1,3,5, S1-4).

**Independent learning**

Allows students to prepare for teaching events and to clarify and extend their understanding of issues covered in module content, allowing students to further explore areas of particular interest and engender an attitude towards continuing professional development and self evaluation. (K1-5, S1,4,5,6,7).

**Opportunities to demonstrate achievement of the learning outcomes are provided through the following assessment methods:**

Various forms of assessment methods are used throughout the programme to achieve both self-knowledge and to monitor abilities and progression.

These include unseen written/online examinations, digital media, project, portfolio, set exercises, vivavoce, assessed practicals, objective structured clinical examination (OSCE) and continuous assessment of clinical performance using the Dentistry Portfolio.

The Dentistry Portfolio is a bespoke system where students enter details of every clinical encounter (including phantom head work) together with reflection that is graded by their clinical tutor appropriate to their year of the programme. Behaviours and professionalism in patient clinics are recorded and integrated with clinical performance.

Over time, the Portfolio will demonstrate a student's progress and attainment and will form a comprehensive record of all clinical activity that is taken with them into their first clinical employment.

To aid consistency in the assessment process, the School has standardised marking criteria.

Assessment methods fall into two broad categories:

**Formative**

There are formative assessments throughout the programme in order to provide feedback to students concerning their progress. These provide benchmarks of the student's abilities and identify areas of knowledge, understanding, skills and attitudes that might require further support. These assessments enable student's abilities to be monitored. They provide an opportunity to identify and rectify areas of weakness and to encourage the further development of areas of strength.

**Summative**

All modules have summative assessments. Some modules include gateway assessments that need to be passed to treat patients at that particular stage of the programme.

In addition to these assessments, the School monitors the progress of students via regular progress meetings to include Professionalism.
