## **SOME PLACES TO GIVE WORKING LOCALLY IN THE US:**

**Atlanta** - [The Tender Foundation](#) is driven by the desire to cultivate a community of care. They aim to help the mothers we serve shift out of “crisis mode”.

**Brooklyn** - [KAVI](#)'s work is grounded in the belief that young people are our greatest hope for a more just and peaceful world. When we partner with our communities to invest in our youth, we understand their challenges and can work to change the course of historical inequities, tackling critical social issues such as different forms of violence. Only when ALL youth are treated with compassion and given opportunities to thrive, can we ensure that all communities are vibrant and successful.

**Florida** - [The Dream Defenders](#) is a multiracial group of young people who are organizing to build power in our communities to advance a new vision we have for the state.

**WHAT IS BAIL?** Bail is a set of pre-trial restrictions that some people charged with crimes have imposed on them in hopes of ensuring they comply with the judicial process. In the US, where a money bail system is used, bail is often associated with an exorbitantly high price tag. **In 2009, the US median of money bail for felony charges was \$10,000\*.** The money bail system keeps thousands of individuals who have yet to be convicted or sentenced in the criminal justice system, further perpetuating mass incarceration, and disproportionately criminalizing race and poverty.

**WHAT ARE BAIL FUNDS?** Bail funds are community driven organizations that collect money to post monetary bail for those in jail or pre-trial detention who cannot afford to pay it themselves. This allows individuals to be with their families and communities, to continue working, to continue living their lives while they await trial. **The incredible thing about most bail funds is that they are functionally revolving.** If and when individuals comply with the judicial process, the money that was used for their bail is returned to the person who posted it (in this case, the bail fund), allowing that same money to be used and reused to keep people out of jails.

**HOW DOES SUPPORTING BAIL FUNDS HELP?** Bail reform is integral to criminal justice reform. By supporting local bail funds in places where protests are happening, you can support individuals who are being arrested at demonstrations, those who are demanding change and saying enough is enough. And on the larger scale, donating to bail funds helps keep people out of jail over and over again. *Keep in mind that not everyone being arrested for protesting is being jailed, a lot of them are being arrested, cited, and released. Before you support a community run bail fund, it's worth checking their website and social media platforms to ensure they're in need of donations, and that they have the infrastructure in place to continuously bail people out of jail.*

**HOW ABOUT BAIL REFORM?** Bail reform refers to the reforming the money bail system by reducing its use or by eliminating it entirely. At any given moment, there are nearly half a million people who are unconvicted but confined to jails in the US system\*, many of whom are there simply because they cannot afford to pay bail. **Montreal** - [First Peoples Justice Center of Montréal](#) is active in supporting Aboriginal people in their dealings with the justice system; It designs and produces legal information tools specifically for Aboriginal clients; The Centre offers alternatives to the justice systems.

**Montreal** - [Hoodstock](#) is a group in Montreal-North working to create spaces for dialogue and mobilizing initiatives toward eliminating systemic inequalities and developing inclusive communities that are inclusive, safe and dynamic.

WHILE I'VE GOT YOU HERE...

What does defunding the police actually mean? [This article](#) provides a helpful explanation, [here](#) are some Canada specific thoughts as well.

### **Defunding the police ≠ reforming the police.**

Reform involves implementing changes and policies such as implicit bias trainings, introduction of body cameras, and the banning of chokeholds. Defunding involves budget cuts to policing and an investment in alternatives. This looks like restructuring public spending priorities and reallocating funds previously spent on policing into places like health services, education, housing, social supports and community development. A lot of the pillars that police reform advocates for have been enacted in cities across the US including Minneapolis, Louisville, and New York without yielding the necessary change. So, while reform might sound like a viable solution, it's pretty clear that it doesn't actually fix or solve the larger problems or systemic issues.
