Reading challenges:

Aim to read a new book at least every two weeks, select books from different genres and be inspired by our reading challenges! Please check that the books you are selecting are suitable for your age and interests.

Around the World Challenge:

Read books set in or written by authors from different countries around the world. Each book will take you on a journey to a new location, broadening your understanding of different cultures and global perspectives. For example, you could start in the United Kingdom and read The Secret Garden by Frances Hodgson Burnett before travelling to France when reading The Little Prince by Antoine de Saint-Exupéry and so on!





Book-to-Film Comparison Challenge:

Read books that have been adapted into a film or TV series, then watch the adaptation and compare the two. You can write a brief review discussing which version you preferred and why, focusing on elements like character portrayal, key scenes and themes. Examples could include "The Secret Garden" or "Matilda."

Reading Road Trip Across the UK:

Create a map of the UK and read books set in different regions. You can start in the Highlands of Scotland ("Kidnapped" by Robert Louis Stevenson) before arriving in the streets of London ("Oliver Twist" by Charles Dickens) and finish in the countryside of Devon ("The Hound of the Baskervilles" by Arthur Conan Doyle). You can track your journey across the UK, learning about different places and cultures.





150-Page Book Dash

Read five books that are no longer than 150 pages each! This could include novellas, short stories or plays. For instance, you might read "Animal Farm" by George Orwell or "A Christmas Carol" by Charles Dickens.

Classic vs. Contemporary Challenge

Read one classic novel and one contemporary novel that share a similar theme, setting or genre. Then compare and contrast the two books, discussing how the theme is treated differently based on the time period and the author's style. For example, you could read "Lord of the Flies" by William Golding alongside "The Hunger Games" by Suzanne Collins (both exploring survival and society).
