Finding Keywords

1. You have a research question. Type or write it in the box below, then underline or highlight the most important keywords or keyword phrases.

Research Question or Thesis Statement

Is there a connection between neighborhood air pollution and asthma rates?

2. Look at the keywords you underlined above and think of synonyms (words that mean almost the same thing) and other related terms. **Combine your keywords and synonyms/related terms using the table below**. For an example, look at the example worksheet.

Create combinations of keywords

3. District AND "Particulate Pollution" AND (Asthma OR Bronchial Asthma)

Part 2: Searching in Library Databases

You will complete this part of the worksheet during class. **You do not have to fill this part out before coming to class.**

Database Searching

You are ready to search in a database now! You'll want to start on the "[Databases A-Z and by Subject](#)" page on the library website and select the appropriate subject for your research topic. Remember that getting there and selecting the best subject for your field was part of the online tutorial!

Select a subject from the drop-down and then click on the blue Search button. Next, try one of the Best Bets or another database in the subject list.

Once you're in the database you can use different combinations of your search terms from the table above to construct different searches in the search boxes. Try different combinations of words or change the word order. If you have a two-word phrase, enclose them in quotation marks so that the database will search for them in that order. If you need any help, please ask one of the librarians teaching this session!
