Richard Berk is an Emeritus Professor of Criminology and Statistics at the University of Pennsylvania and an Emeritus Distinguished Professor of Statistics at UCLA. Professor Berk is an elected fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American Statistical Association, and the Academy of Experimental Criminology, and has served on the National Research Council's Committee on Applied and Theoretical Statistics and on the Social Science Research Council's Board of Directors. He has been awarded the Paul F. Lazarsfeld Award by the Methodology Section of the American Sociological Association. He works on various topics in applied statistics including causal inference, machine learning, forecasting, and post-model-selection inference. Among his criminology applications are inmate classification and placement systems, detecting violations of environmental regulations, and forecasting criminal behavior of individuals on parole or probation. Professor Berk is the author of over 150 peer reviewed publications including 15 books. His most recent book in statistics is Statistical Learning from a Regression Perspective (Third edition, Springer, 2020).
