Abstract (Abstract should be written in Times New Roman 12, bold, single spacing, spacing before 12 pt, after 2 pt)

The abstract must be written in two languages, English and Indonesian. It briefly contains the research objectives, methods, results, and conclusions. The abstract consists of 200 words, single-spaced, and written in italics for the English version. Keywords (maximum five words) must be included below the abstract, with the first keyword being the most important. The Indonesian abstract is a translation of the English version. Editors reserve the right to edit the abstract for clarity. References should not be included, and any abbreviation must be written in full when first introduced..

Keywords: content, format, article.

[The abstract is immediately followed by a maximum of 5 keywords written in lowercase letters; avoid common words or those with multiple meanings (for example, “and,” “that,” “from”). Each keyword is separated by a semicolon, and only commonly used technical abbreviations may be used as keywords. The purpose of these keywords is to facilitate search indexing.

INTRODUCTION

The introduction must contain (in sequence): general background, review of previous literature (state of the art) as the basis for the novelty of the article, statement of scientific novelty, and research problems or hypotheses. At the end of this section, the research objectives must be clearly stated.

In scientific articles, a separate literature review section is not allowed as in research reports; instead, it should be integrated into the state-of-the-art discussion followed by the novelty statement.

Citations must follow the bodynote format such as (Uwuigbe & Ajibolade, 2013), (Wang, 2016), (Muttakin et al., 2015), and must correspond with the reference list (recommended using Mendeley).

[Article format: must be written in a word processor (PDF submissions are not allowed), single column, full margin, 1–1.15 spacing, Times New Roman 12 pt, justified alignment, with page numbering as shown.]

METHOD

This section explains how the research was conducted. It includes:

- (1) research design;
- (2) population and sample;
- (3) data collection techniques and instrument development;
- (4) data analysis techniques.

For studies using tools and materials, their specifications must be described.

For qualitative research (e.g., classroom action research, ethnography, phenomenology, case studies), include researcher presence, research subjects, informants, data collection techniques, location and duration, and validity checking procedures.

Avoid using sub-subsections unless necessary.

RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

The analysis must explain findings using appropriate analytical tools aligned with the research objectives. It should be detailed enough to support conclusions. Supporting calculations may be placed in appendices.

Figures and tables must be centered and labeled (e.g., Figure 1, Table 1) and placed immediately after they are referenced.

(Figures must be clear, minimum resolution 800 dpi, preferably 1200 dpi; smallest font size 6 pt)

Equations must be centered, numbered sequentially on the right (e.g., (1), (2)), using Times New Roman or Symbol font. Variables in italics, vectors in bold.

The analysis must answer research questions and confirm whether hypotheses are accepted or rejected (for quantitative research). Also discuss limitations, challenges, and implications.

CONCLUSION

The conclusion presents answers to the research objectives or hypotheses. It should not repeat results but summarize key findings and their implications. Future research directions may also be included.

SUGGESTIONS

Suggestions provide recommendations for improvement or ideas for further research.

REFERENCES

All cited works must be listed. At least 80% must be from primary sources (scientific journals) published within the last 10 years. A minimum of 15 references is required. Use reference management software such as Mendeley, EndNote, or Zotero.

Use APA (American Psychological Association) citation style.
