Event planning restrictions

Unauthorized and Restricted Activities

The following activities have been declared unauthorized and restricted by the Boy Scouts of America:

- 1. All-terrain vehicles (ATVs or UTVs) are banned from program use. The exception is council-approved ATV programs. They are not approved for unit use. ATVs are defined as motorized recreational cycles with three or four large, soft tires, designed for off-road use on a variety of terrains.
- 2. Boxing, karate, and related martial arts—except judo, aikido, and Tai Chi— are not authorized activities.
- 3. Chainsaws and mechanical log splitters may be authorized for use only by trained individuals over the age of 18, using proper protective gear in accordance with local laws.
- 4. Exploration of abandoned mines is an unauthorized activity.
- 5. Varsity football teams and interscholastic or club football competition and activities are unauthorized activities.
- 6. Fireworks secured, used, or displayed in conjunction with program and activities is unauthorized except where the fireworks display is conducted under the auspices of a certified or licensed fireworks control expert.
- 7. The selling of fireworks as a fund-raising or money-earning activity by any group acting for or on behalf of members, units, or districts may not be authorized by councils.
- 8. Flying in hang gliders, ultralights, experimental aircraft, or hot-air balloons (nontethered); parachuting; and flying in aircraft as part of a search and rescue mission are unauthorized activities. Tethered hot-air balloon flights are authorized, and a flying plan must be completed. 46 The online version of the Guide to Safe Scouting is updated quarterly. Go to http://www.scouting.org/HealthandSafety/GSS.aspx.
- 9. Motorized go-carts and motorbike activities are unauthorized for Cub Scout and Boy Scout programs. Go-carting conducted at a commercial facility that provides equipment and supervision of cart operation is authorized with parental consent for any youth participant. Participating in motorized speed events (racing), including motorcycles, boats, drag racing, demolition derbies, and related events are not authorized activities for any program level.
- 10. Participation in amateur or professional rodeo events and council or district sponsorship of rodeos are not authorized. This includes mechanized bulls and similar devices.
- 11. Pointing any type of firearm or simulated firearm at any individual is unauthorized. This prohibition includes archery tag. Scout units may plan or participate in paintball, laser tag or similar events where participants shoot at targets that are neither living nor human representations. Units may participate in formally organized historical reenactment events, where firearms are used and intentionally aimed over the heads of the reenactment participants. The use of paintball guns, laser guns, or similar devices may be utilized in target shooting events following the Sweet 16 of BSA Safety.
- 12. Hunting is not an authorized Cub Scout or Boy Scout activity, although hunting safety is part of the program curriculum. (The purpose of this policy is to restrict chartered packs, troops, and teams from conducting hunting trips. However, this policy does not restrict Venturing crews from conducting hunting trips or special adult hunting expeditions provided that adequate safety procedures are followed and that all participants have obtained necessary permits and/or licenses from either state or federal agencies. While hunter safety education might not be required prior to obtaining a hunting license, successful completion of the respective state voluntary program is required before participating in the activity.)
- 13. Motorized personal watercraft (PWC), such as Jet-Skis®, are not authorized for use in Scouting aquatics, and their use should not be permitted in or near BSA program areas. The exception is council-approved PWC programs. They are not approved for unit use.
- 14. Except for law enforcement officers required to carry firearms within their jurisdiction, firearms shall not be brought on camping, hiking, backpacking, or other Scouting activities except those specifically planned for target shooting under the supervision of a currently certified BSA national shooting sports director or National Rifle Association firearms instructor.
- 15. Parasailing, or any activity in which a person is carried aloft by a parachute, parasail, kite, or other device towed by a motorboat, including a tube, or by any other means, is unauthorized.
- 16. All activities related to bungee cord jumping (sometimes called shock cord jumping) are unauthorized. 47 The online version of the Guide to Safe Scouting is updated quarterly. Go to http://www.scouting.org/HealthandSafety/GSS.aspx.
- 17. Technical tree-climbing with ropes or harnesses is not authorized as an activity.
- 18. Water chugging and related activities are not authorized for any program level.
- 19. Bubbleball, Knockerball™, zorbing, Battle Ball™, bubble soccer or football, and similar orb activities where participants run into one other or roll around on land or water have been reviewed and are now unauthorized, except for supervised bubble soccer programs operated by councils with an approved pilot.

Committee organization, meetings and responsibilities

Troop Committee Chairman Responsibilities

- Organize the committee to see that all functions are delegated, coordinated and completed.
- Maintain a close relationship with the chartered organization representative and the Scoutmaster.
- See that unit leaders and committee members have training opportunities.
- Interpret national and local policies to the unit.
- Work closely with the Scoutmaster in preparing Troop Committee meeting agendas.
- Call, preside over, and promote attendance at monthly unit committee meetings and any special meetings that may be called.
- Ensure unit representation at monthly roundtables.
- Secure top-notch, trained individuals for camp membership.
- Arrange for charter review and recharter annually.
- Plan the charter presentation program.

Troop Committee Responsibilities

- Ensures that quality adult leadership is recruited and trained. In case the Scoutmaster is absent, a qualified Assistant Scoutmaster is assigned. If the Scoutmaster is unable to serve, a replacement is recruited.
- Provides adequate meeting facilities.
- Advises the Scoutmaster on policies relating to Boy Scouting and the chartered organization.
- Supports leaders in carrying out the program.
- Is responsible for finances, adequate funds, and disbursements in line with the approved budget plan.
- Obtains, maintains, and properly cares for troop property.
- Ensures the troop has an outdoor program (minimum 10 days and nights per year).
- Serves on boards of review and courts of honor.
- Supports the Scoutmaster in working with individual boys and problems that may affect the overall troop program.
- Provides for the special needs and assistance some boys may require.
- Helps with the Friends of Scouting campaign.
- Assists the Scoutmaster with handling boy behavioral problems.

Troop Positions.

Chartered Organization Representative

The <u>Chartered Organization Representative</u> is the direct contact between the unit and the <u>Chartered Organization</u>. This individual is also the organization's contact with the district committee and the <u>Local Council</u>. The chartered organization representative may become a member of the district committee and is a voting member of the council. The Chartered Organization Representative appoints the unit committee chair.

Troop Committee Chairman

The unit <u>committee chair</u> is appointed by the chartered organization and registered as an <u>adult leader</u> of the BSA. The unit committee chairman appoints and supervises the unit committee and unit leaders.

Troop Secretary

The <u>unit secretary</u> is appointed by the committee chairman to keep minutes and records, send notices, and handle publicity.

Troop Treasurer

The <u>unit treasurer</u> is appointed by the committee chairman to handle unit funds, pay bills, maintain accounts, coordinate the annual Friends of Scouting (FOS) campaign, and supervise fundraising.

Troop Advancement Chair

The <u>unit advancement chair</u> is appointed by the committee chairman to ensure that the unit has at least monthly <u>boards</u> <u>of review</u>, quarterly <u>courts of honor</u>, and that the unit has goals of helping each Scout advance a rank each year and for new Scouts to reach <u>First Class rank during their first year</u>. The advancement coordinator is also responsible for record keeping and submitting advancement reports.

Troop Equipment Coordinator

The <u>unit equipment coordinator</u> is appointed by the committee chairman to work with the youth <u>Quartermaster</u> and is responsible inventory, storage, and maintenance of unit equipment.

Troop Outdoor/Activities Chair

The <u>unit outdoor/activities chair</u> is appointed by the committee chairman to secure tour permits and permission to use camping site, serve as transportation coordinator, ensure a monthly outdoor program.

Troop Membership Chair

The <u>unit membership chair</u> is appointed by the committee chairman to help ensure a smooth transition of new Scouts into the unit and orientation for new parents.

Troop Training Chair

The <u>unit training chair</u> is appointed by the committee chairman to ensure training opportunities are available, maintain training records and materials, and is responsible for BSA <u>Youth Protection training</u>.

Troop Public Relations Chair

The unit public relations chair is appointed by the committee chairman to inform parents of their responsibilities in Scouting and with the chartered organization. Provides news and announcements about the unit to newspapers, bulletins of sponsors, web sites, etc. Promotes and stimulates service projects, Scouting Anniversary Week, Scout Sunday or Scout Sabbath, and family participation in unit events. Promotes new membership and lets people in the neighborhood know that Scouting is available.

Troop Friends of Scouting (FOS) Chair

The unit <u>Friends of Scouting</u> chair is appointed by the committee chairman to work closely with the unit committee on public relations for FOS; conducts annual FOS campaign to enroll family members and adult leaders in FOS; gives recognition to contributors and enrollees.

Troop Fundraising Chair

The <u>Unit Fundraising Chair</u>, also called the "Popcorn Kernel" in some <u>councils</u>, is appointed by the committee chairman to supervise <u>Fundraising</u> and ensure that every youth member has the opportunity to participate in <u>Popcorn</u> sales or other council <u>Fundraising</u> events.

Direct youth contact leaders

Troop Chaplain

The <u>unit chaplain</u> is appointed by the committee chairman to provide spiritual tone, guide the <u>chaplain aide</u>, give spiritual counseling, and promote the regular religious participation of each member.

Scoutmaster

The <u>Scoutmaster</u> is the adult responsible for working directly with the Scouts to help them create the program for the troop. The Scoutmaster trains boy leaders to run the troop by providing direction, coaching, and support.

Assistant Scoutmaster(s)

An <u>Assistant Scoutmaster</u> is one of the <u>adult leaders</u> age 18 or over who assist the Scoutmaster in delivering the troop program.
