#### **Art Integration Strategies**

- Create signs with text and/or image that communicates how you feel
- Produce a writing sample in English/History/Language class and highlight the keywords (3 word max per line) and turn that into a poem.
- Create a visual representation of the work you have submitted in class.
- Social media posts that explain how you feel.
- Art therapy ideas (draw/paint your emotions, collage, timeline sculpture, create something and destroy it, draw something in the dirt, written words with water on pavement, draw a safe place, journal your loss, draw something that scares you)
- Design your own world. What does it look like? How do people act in that world?
